

HON. SIR WILFRID LAURIER, PREMIER.

"No Has Ever Sought to Unite the People of Canada in Bonds of Mutual Love and Helpfulness."

(Montreal Daily Witness.) The City of Toronto, and in fact the whole of our sister province, is at present preparing for a visit which Sir Wilfrid Laurier intends to pay to the Ontario capital upon the twenty-first of next month. The intention of the Premier at first was merely to visit the University of Toronto and address the students there in response to an invitation from that institution. Then a banquet in his honor was suggested by Toronto Liberals. This idea has been discussed but such enthusiasm has been manifested, and so many admirers of Canada's foremost statesman have signified their intention of visiting the city upon the occasion that no dining hall can be discovered large enough to accommodate the numbers expected. The precise form which the celebration will take, however, is not of such general interest, as the significance of the fact that Toronto University, Toronto itself and the Province of Ontario at large -- all overwhelmingly English and Protestant -- are uniting to honor a great French-Canadian and a Roman Catholic. Of course there is a discordant note struck here and there. The Evening Telegram, with a sense of things fitting not unusual with that journal, calls Sir Wilfrid "a patron of race and creed war," and "arch cooperator of oppressor of Mr. Haughton." The great majority of the people of Ontario are unimpressed by such partisan hysterics. This tyrant estimate of Sir Wilfrid's character has, but recently taken the place of another equally untrue, which represented him as himself a good man, but so gentle and confident as to come easily under the sway of strong-minded and unscrupulous colleagues. How either a weakling or a tyrant could provoke such popular loyalty as Sir Wilfrid has done no one has attempted to explain. Another version of Sir Wilfrid's career, as absurd as either of others, represents him as a triangler, cleverly balancing himself upon the fence, in all subjects where controversy is likely to ensue, and then dropping to whatever side pays the best in material gain or popularity. Such accusations were at one time daily levelled at the best of Gladstone, every day of whose policy the world now knows was the outcome of the deepest heart-searching

It is superior to timothy for milk production. The curdy proportion of milk is a constituent, and clover hay is the richer. Or a mixture of clover and timothy hay, or of peas and oats is good. Hay is also a rich source of yield of milk. Make a test of your cows and know what the individual cow is doing, knowing what she is doing you become real interested in the work. Begin with the good ones. The best way to build up your herd is to rear calves from the best cows in the herd and have a good sire. Build your cow up to produce 200 or 250 lbs. of butter each year. Don't take the average of the whole herd, as a lot of poor cows were boarding on the good ones. Don't let one cow make up for what is lacking in another. Another point was to milk the heifer right during the first milking period. We want to establish a persistency in milking. Feed and care for the cow and encourage her to give a good supply of milk for long period, and don't let her go dry. Mr. Mitchell in continuing spoke on the QUALITY OF MILK AND CREAM. That will produce a good class of butter. Consistency of milk comes from three sources. Food factors was one and undesirable forms of germ life was another. Keep up your reputation in winter as well as in summer and don't get both on the farm and in the creamery, use clean utensils. Cattle should be cleaned. By wading through cess pools the cattle gathered up dirt, which when milked, gets into the milk pail. Wipe the cows off with a brush before putting the pail under them and milk with dry hands. When cows are not properly cleaned off, sometimes gathering in the milk, farmers should change their milk yards and have them in good conditions. They were in many cases a disgrace and woman should not be asked to enter them at all. Separators should be cleaned after every time used--have them look clean and small clean, inside and outside and stand them in a clean place, not on a ground floor, as often times milk would fall on the earth floor and a bad odor would be the result. Cool your cream as soon as possible and keep it around, and don't let empty warm cream into the cold; keep in separate vessel until both are cool. Don't guess with regard to temperature of the cream. Cool it down to 50 degrees by the use of ice. Store about two tons of ice for each cow you are milking. Build a little lean-to for ice, and put a tank in it to cool your cream. In regard to the richness of cream, take 30 per cent. as your standard, and don't go above 33 per cent. If you send poor cream to the creamery it means a loss. Don't get it too rich. Cream of 40 per cent. is too rich. Mr. Wm. Flavell gave a short talk regarding the export trade, in which he commended the butter of Victoria Creamery, it being of good quality. They had sent some of the Lindsay butter to the lower provinces, to the Yukon, and even to South Africa. They still handled dairy butter, but not just around here--more so in and around Barrie and Orillia. Dairy butter meant a loss of nearly 50 per cent, and Lindsay was ahead by having a good creamery. A short discussion then followed in which those present joined. It was pointed out that the creamery was head of the cheese factory. Mr. Gillespie, of Peterboro, and Mr. Day spoke very briefly along dairy lines.

LARGE BUTTER FAT RECORD.

WHAT FOODS PRODUCED THIS GRAND SHOWING.

Interesting Records Compiled by a Wisconsin Authority. The world's official record for butter fat is now held by the Guernsey cow Yelva Sunbeam 15439, owned by Mr. Fred Rietbrock, Athens, Wis. The record has been made under the supervision of Professor Wolf of the Wisconsin station and there is no doubt as to its correctness, astonishing as it may seem. For this cow from October, '04 to September, '05, twelve months, gave 14,920 pounds of milk, with an average per cent. of 5.774 of butter fat, or 857.15 pounds of butter fat, equivalent to 1,000 pounds of butter during the twelve months. It may be interesting to our readers to know of what this great Cassears fed, as follows: October--Silage and hay 25 pounds, with 15 pounds grain mixture composed of one part oil meal, 2 parts ground oats, 2 parts gluten feed and 4 parts bran. November--Corn silage 30 pounds, with grain mixture the same as October. December--Same as November. January--Silage 30 pounds, rutabagas 10 pounds, 15 pounds grain mixture composed of one part ground oats, 10 parts gluten feed, 2 parts bran, part oil meal, and alfalfa, hay, ad lib. February--Silage 30 pounds, rutabagas 20 pounds, 14 pounds grain mixture composed of 4 parts wheat bran, 1 part oil meal, 1 part ground oats, 1 part corn and alfalfa, ad lib. March--Same as February. April--Same as February. May--Same as February. June--Pasture, mixed clover hay and 6 pounds above grain mixture. July--10 pounds mixed grain ration composed of 300 pounds bran, 1,200 pounds oats, 200 pounds gluten feed and 100 pounds oil meal. Pasture ad lib. August--10 pounds above grain mixture, 8 pounds green clover at noon and pasture ad lib. September--Clover pasture, green corn, clover hay and 2 pounds gluten 6 pounds bran, 4 pounds ground oats, 2 pounds oil meal. Our readers will notice that with the exception of the silage and a small portion of corn meal during the month of February this cow had no corn at all; that she was fed a strictly dairy ration, and that the great bulk of this ration, all of it, was made up of gluten feed and bran, can be grown on any good farm in the northern portions of our territory. This banner cow is evidently a great feeder and is particularly a great consumer of roughage, as most good cows are. She gives a wonderfully high per cent. of butter fat. From month to month, the lowest per cent being 5.25 in June and the highest 6.08 in December. From December to March, inclusive, there was but one month in which the percentage was less than 6 per cent., 5.75 per cent. in February.

BRITAIN WANTS OUR CREAMERY BUTTER

Interesting and Profitable Addresses Delivered at the Annual Meeting of Victoria Creamery Patrons--A Profitable Season.

The annual meeting of the Victoria Creamery was held in the creamery building, corner William and Russell-sts., on the 25th, when some thirty or forty patrons were present to listen to the annual report presented by Secretary W. F. O'Boyle, and two or three addresses, in which heaps of valuable information was imparted. Mr. W. J. Mitchell, Superintendent of Kingston Dairy School, was the principal speaker. Mr. Jas. Roache, of Ops, acted as chairman. Secretary O'Boyle's report was very encouraging, showing a considerable increase in the output, and consequently in the revenue, and the patrons present were well pleased. Mr. M. J. Lewis, the proprietor, spoke first along general lines. He was thankful to the farmers for their good patronage. The creamery business of to-day had become a great industry, and they should keep it abreast of the times. To do so the first thing was to study the cows--the breeding and feeding of cows, and the care of the product--milk and cream. Cleanliness is the greatest necessity in butter making and it starts with the milk. If milk is delivered in a poor state it is almost impossible to get the best product. Lindsay should manufacture as good a product as is made anywhere. Butter making was practically in its infancy in the Old Country. After proper good goods then we look for proper results; once the product was ready market at the best prices. A decided improvement could be made in getting good cream. There were too many turnips used in this vicinity, and the flavor had to be considered--customers want the flavor right, and once it will stick to it, but as soon as the flavor becomes bad they will drop it and buy another line. Mr. Lewis then advocated that the separators should be properly kept and cleaned. No farmer could expect good results from a dirty separator. It should be cleaned every time it is used. The cream should be cooled as soon after separating as possible. He solicited the help of the patrons in getting good cream, and then he would have no trouble in getting the highest prices. Mr. Wm. Newman, manager of the Lorneville creamery, said they were in the business to get profits for the farmers and for themselves. Better

RAILWAY NOTES

The James Bay R.R., having its rails laid as far south from Beaverton as it is intended to work, 52 miles, will practically suspend this week until spring, when a large gang of men will be put on to ballast. North of Beaverton work is still in progress at different points, wherever possible. In Mara work on the big cut at Kehoe's hill has been suspended, and so far no move has been made to bridge the canal or embankment made to bridge the canal or embankment. Our correspondent at Omemeo writes: The railway situation here is causing citizens a good deal of anxiety. It is reported that the old G. T. R. track is to be abandoned and a new line built running directly from Reboro to Bethany. This step will be taken in order to secure a level road, and to avoid grades and curves. To avoid big grades and to secure a direct road to Peterboro, the Peterboro-Georgian Bay branch of the C. P. R. is bound to keep three miles north of the village, which is somewhat disappointing to the citizens, who thought that the line would run through Omemeo.
