CRAND SHOWING. Interesting Records Compiled by a Wisconsin Authority.

The world's official record for butter fat is now held by the Guernsey cow Yelesa Sunbeam 15439, owned by Mr. Fred Riettrock, Athens, Wis. The record has been made under the aspervision of Professor Woll of the Wisconsin station and there is no doubt as to its correctness, astonishing as it may seem. For this cow from October, '04 to September, '05, twelve months, gave 14,-920 pounds of milk, with an average per cent. of 5.774 of butter fat, or 857.15 pounds of butter fat, equivalent to 1,000 pounds of butter during the twelve months.
