THE "PEG" CURLERS RETURN

ARRIVED HOME LAST NIGHT—MET BY LARGE CROWD.

Rink Speaks Highly of Treatment Received Best Rinks Won.

A fair sized crowd of Lindsay citizens gathered at the C. P. R. depot last evening to welcome home the four townsmen who so valiantly had upheld the credit of old Ontario as a curling centre in Winnipeg, the metropolis of the west.
As the 7:30 train pulled in, it was with pleasure that the crowd saw the well known faces of the four stalwarts—Messrs. W. Ressor, G. A. Little, T. Burke and J. D. Flavell—and on alighting, many a hearty grasp of the hand that must have made the men feel glad. A cab was in readiness and the four gentlemen were conveyed to the curling rink. Here a few leading citizens and enthusiastic curlers had gathered to hear the "Peg" rink recount their battles. Dr. Wood acted as master of ceremonies, and in a neat little speech complimented the men on their splendid showing. Although they had not carried off many prizes they had won fame for themselves and their native town, and had shown a true sportsman's spirit. All Lindsay citizens were proud of their achievements and the way they had acquitted themselves in the West.
The honor that had been bestowed on Mr. Flavell by the Manitoba Curling Association who had elected him an honorary member and presented him with a handsome medal, was dwelt on by Dr. Wood who complimented the curler on his popularity in the West.
Mr. J. D. Flavell in reply thanked the citizens for the reception tendered the rink. They had done their best, but curling was a "slippery" game (laughter). Braden had given them a square beating and the winners of the events had won of their merits. The people he had seen on his trip to Winnipeg.
Mr. Tim Burke said he had had a splendid time and enjoyed himself immensely. It was his first trip to the West but he had formed a good opinion of the people and the country.
Mr. Walter Ressor said he thought receptions should be eliminated, especially when they were not earned. (Laughter). The trip had come to be looked upon as an annual affair by him and he always had a delightful time. The people he came in contact with were very sociable. The games lost had been won by better men and Braden's victory was a win for the better rink. He said the prizes received—4 silver manure sets—white useless to him, were very handsome.
Mr. G. A. Little being absent several prominent members of the club were called upon, and all expressed themselves as "delighted to see them back", with or without the silverware.
The medal Mr. Flavell had received was then exhibited. It is very handsome, and on it is engraved the token of the Manitoba Curling Association.
Three hearty cheers were then given for the "Peg" rink and the gathering then dispersed.

McGILL AT KINGSTON.

Former Bank Manager in Penitentiary—Duties Will be Light.

A Kingston despatch says; Charles McGill, a former manager of the Ontario Bank, who entered the penitentiary on Saturday, after passing through the usual formalities of a close hair, cut, a bath and a change of apparel, was this morning introduced into the duties which will occupy his time at the big penal institutions for the next four years and two months, the remaining ten months to be gained by his expected good conduct. He will be employed as clerk in the blacksmithing department, taking the place of another convict who completes his term in a couple of days. His duties will be purely clerical, consisting of keeping account of the amount of material which comes into the department the work of each of the thirty convict blacksmiths and the total of the finished product, together with the department of the institution for which it is made. McGill's duties will be light and he will not be forced to mingle with the other convicts. His cell is in the same tier as those of the other blacksmiths.
