SIXTY-THREE YEARS MARRIED.

The Parents of Mr. W. J. Cairns, Town, Celebrate a Memorable Anniversary.

Montreal Witness, Mar. 15th: Mr. and Mrs. James Cairns, who are spending their declining days with their daughter, Mrs. W. H. Scott, 11 May avenue, Verdun, celebrated the sixty-third anniversary of their marriage on Feb. 26th. They were married Feb. 26th, 1839, at Oshawa, Ont., where they spent twenty-six years of their married life, moving to Prescott, Ont., in 1865, where they resided up to two years ago. Mr. Cairns in business was a successful contractor and builder, in politics a staunch conservative and familiarly known by his numerous friends in South Grenville as the "Old War Horse" in religion a Methodist, filling the important position of local preacher for upwards of forty years. He took part in the famous battle of the Windmill in November, 1838, and takes great delight in relating his experiences of that period. The winters of 1845 to 1852 he spent shantying on the Ottawa and is very much interested in Ralph Connor's latest production, "The Man From Glenagarry," which he pronounces very true to life.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Cairns are in their eighty-fourth year and their many friends will be pleased to hear that they are in possession of all their faculties and considering their age are exceptionally well. With the exception of one daughter, who died young, their family, consisting of five daughters and four sons, are all living and residing in different parts of Canada as follows: Mrs. E. E. Mattice, Lunenburg, Ont.; Mr. S. Cairns, Prescott, Ont.; Mr. W. J. Cairns, Roadmaster G.T.R., Lindsay, Ont.; Mr. G. R. Cairns, Cornwall, Ont.; Mrs. W. H. Scott, Montreal, Que.; Mrs. D. Parker, Winnipeg, Man.; and Mrs. S. E. De la Ronde, Ottawa, Ont. There have been 48 grandchildren and seventeen great-grandchildren, making a grand total of seventy-four, of which fifty-four are living.
