MISS JOHNSTON KILLED.

Fatal Runaway Took Place Near Belleville Saturday. Belleville, March 9 .- A runaway ac-

cident happened Saturday afternoon, close to the Village of Foxboro, which resulted in the death of one person and serious, possibly fatal, injury to another. John Lithgow of Chatterton, accompanied by his sister-in-law, Miss Johnston of this city, was driving home after a visit to Belleville. Mr. Lithgow's team was a spirited one. While trying to pass another rig on the road the two conveyances collided, frightening Lithgow's horses, which started to run away. After going a short distance, the wagon struck a bad piece of road, and both the occupants were thrown out. Miss Johnston had five ribs broken in fall, the splintered ribs penetrating her heart. Buffalo Police Subject Canadian Girl to "Third Degree."

MISS HUTCHINSON TORTURED

Daughter of Dr. Hutchinson, of London, Ont., Arrested in Connection With Burdick Murder-District Attorney Says She Is Entirely Innecent-Grossly Outraged Lady Was Released After Four Mours.

Buffalo, March 9 .- Police impotency or inability to cope with a mystery in which the participants move in social circles higher than those in which the authorities alone know how to work has brought the startling Burdick murder case to a halt. A most outrageous proceeding on the part of the authorities was the arrest and detention on Saturday of Miss Marion Hutchinson, a handsome and accomplished young Canadian girl, who had been employed in Burdick's office. The blunder has caused condemnation. The girl satisfied the officers that she was innocent after hours in the sweat box, where the "third degree" was resorted to. Charge of Robbing Postoffice. Ottawa, March 9.-Sensational development may spring from the poisoned chocolate case, which has late been exciting much speculation in Rat Portage. R. & O. Vessel Montreal Goes Up in Smoke at Montreal.

ONE DEAD AND MANY INJURED

Collapse of a Shed on the Wharf Under Weight of Spectators - Roof Comes Down on Crowd Underneath-Hospitals Taxed to Care For the Injured-Loss Half a Million Dollars.

Montreal, March 9 .- The R. & O. Co.'s magnificent new steamer, Montreal, burned to the water's edge, at a loss of \$400,000 to the Bertram Company, Toronto, with the certain loss of several lives, were the results of one of the greatest disasters by fire which has ever occurred in this city.

Between nine and ten Saturday evening flames leaping hundreds of feet from the nearly finished steamer called thousands of citizens from their homes to witness the burning ship. The new steamer Montreal was by far the largest and finest ever built in Canada, and although not quite completed, the contractors for the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Co. had already expended four hundred thousand dollars on it. The upper saloon was the most magnificently decorated of any vessel ever built in

Although the fire department was early on the spot it soon became ev-The president of the company, Hon. L. J. Forget, made a statement last night to the effect that the value of the boat was \$350,000, covered by insurance, but as the boat had not been turned over to the company, the direct loss, if any, will fall upon the builders.

A later report issued shows that the Richelieu and Ontario Company had paid \$325,000 to the Bertrams on account of the steamer, and had received against the insurance, policles amounting to £80,000. Mr. Bertram will be here to-day.

The Sheds Collapsed. The loss of life, however, was in connection with a terrible fall sheds near at hand. At the Allan wharf the shed frame remained but the iron sides and the roof had

been removed for the winter. People anxious for a good view of the great blazing steamer thronged the wharf, and hundreds climbed on the rafters. Suddenly there was an awful crack and the great structure collapsed. The heavy rafters crushed down upon the crowd below. Many jumped, or were forced over on the ice; others were crushed under the

weight of the falling beams. There was a momentary panic, and then the work of getting out the injured was rapidly proceeded with. Police patrol wagons, salvage wagons and cabs were hurriedly pressed into service to augment the ambulances, and soon a hurried procession of carriages filled with wounded was wending its way to the hospitals, while people on foot aided in carrying torn and bleeding men and boys to taverns and other temporary places of refuge in the vicinity; hundreds who simply received cuts hands and faces, but were able get about had their injuries dressed as well as possible near the scene of the trouble, and were assisted to their homes. The hospitals all had their hands full, and several of the victims are so badly hurt that their lives are despaired of.
