The present number of inmates was 160, thus leaving vacancies for forty. He also pointed out that by a change of the lawy it would be practicable for the Industrial School to take charge of a portion of the boys now at the reformatory, while some arrangement could be made to provide for the Roman Catholic boys in some

similar institution. As it is now, the Minister pointthe Inudstrial School, owing to the sent to the latter institution, whereas when lads were seut direct to the reformatory the expense fell directly upon the Province. At present there were ninety boys in the reformatory. The Minister is of the opinion that a number of these boys could suitably be placed in foster homes, while provision could be made for the more deprayed or incorrigible by the erection of a cottage at Mimico, so situated and managed that they would | Highest Grade Manitoba be isolated from the other boys of the school, and not exercise a contaminating influence. Mr. Stratton said that the maintenance of a boy at the Industrial School cost \$3 per week, while it cost \$300 a year at the Penetanguishene Reformatory. where the boys were educated and taught trades. He thought that a change in the law whereby a re-arrangement of the burden of maintenance could be made would relieve

the province of considerable ex-The Reformatory at Penetanguishene is a large dormitory building, which can be adapted to the care of 300 or 400 of the more harmless senile patients now confined in other asylums, thus relieving the congestiion which unhappily exists. Then by the erection of an institution for epileptics, instead of a new reformatory, accommodation would be provided for a considerable class of asylum patients, who are perhaps doubtfully fitted for an asylu, but who are otherwise without home and un-

cared for. The really bad, vicious and incorrigible lads, instead of being a practical burden and detriment to creformatory, could be committed to the Central Prison, or otherwise provid-

The directors of the Industrial approved of the suggestions of the Provincial Secretary, if they can be worked out satisfactorily with regard to all the interests concerned.
