is reversed (open end on the ground) and an opening one foot high made across one side of the box against the open and. Two one inch by two inch cleats are nailed on the two ends of the box at the ground, the cover or floor being reduced in size so that it will slide in on these cleats. This allows the floor to be removed for cleaning. The box should be covered with tar paper to make it water-tight and there should be a 10x14 inch pene of glass in the front. This glass should slide in cleats for ventilation. In front of the one foot opening at the ground there should by a crate 15 inches high covered with laths, two inches agart. THE TRENT VALLEY CANAL

Discussed at the Surveyor's Convention in Toronto This Week.

We take the following from the Toronto World's report of the proceedings at Ontario Surveyors' convers tion, held in the city Wednesday: Canada's Canal Systam.

J. G. Sing's paper on "Transportation" was read by Mayor Sankey. It advocated the increase of elevators and the diversion of grain from United States ports to those of Canada. Buffalo had 184 million buchels of wheat, as compared with 45 millions exported through Canadian ports and backaches, and the special ail-Another \$100,000,000 must be spent on our canal system to make it a factor in our transportation. Sing expected to see four or five transcontinental lines before many years passed.

J. Alexander Culverwell,, of Peterboro, spoke on the Trart Valley Canal. It was just as well to recognize that the canal had obtained a bad name owing to political consideran tions. As a matter of fact it was a weterway rather than a canal. Out of 200 miles between Midland and Lake Ontario only 18 miles were actual canal. Four millions had been spent upon it, and five more, making nine millions in all, would be necessary to complete it. This should be compared with the cost of the Erie canal at a hundred millions. The idea of deep-water canals was ex-

ploded, the best engineers having pended on length and breadth of lock rather than depth, and it was recognized that a greater bulk could be more cheaply handled by the barge system. Mr. Culverwell hoped that a fresh start would be made in this work, which could be finished in three years if pushed, and that the public would be induced to consider it seriously.
