### FATALITY ON THE I. B. & O.

### ENGINEER ASKA CLARK RUN OVER AND KILLED TUESDAY.

Train left the Rails Owing to Ice and the Unfortunate Driver Jumped and was Run Over.

Tuesday afternoon friends at Fenelon Falls, were notified that Driver Aska Clark, of the Ironclad & Bancroft line, had lost his life as the result of a deplorable accident on that line early in the day.

The particulars available are meagre. They are to the effect that owing to the ice on the rails a double-header train was being sent over the line, Clark being in charge of the leading engine. At a point near Heeley's siding or crossing, where there is an embankment about 30 feet high, the front engine left the rails and Clark, while preparing to jump, fell or was thrown under the wheels of the second engine, sustaining such severe injuries that he died soon after.

The deceased was a fine specimen of manhood and was popular with all patrons of the road and the general public.

Later, as we go to press Thursday morning we learn from Mr. L. B. Howland, manager of the road, who was storm-stayed at Fenelon Falls Wednesday, that a telegram received by him that evening was to the effect that Driver Clark was not fatally injured, as at first reported, and that he will be able to resume his duties in the near future.

The Kent-st. merchant who has promised us mud—possibly just—for the 17th will lose his prestige as a weather prophet ere long if better weather conditions don't soon appear.

Mr. Walter H. McGill, merchant of Fenelon Falls, (successor to Walter Brown), was in town last week looking after spring goods shipments which were unfortunately delayed by the prevailing storms.

Mr. Alex. Fisher has greatly improved the appearance of the interior of his grocery store on William-st. north. The painters have finished their work and the store now presents a bright and neat aspect.

The name of Rev. J. W. Macmillan, former pastor of St. Andrew's, was omitted from our report of the list of Winnipeg citizens who joined in sending a wreath to be placed on the coffin of the late Ernest Sackville.

The factories at Campbellford have had considerable trouble with ice stopping the flow of water to the water-wheels. The paper mills there found it necessary to use dynamite to clear the race-way, and 542 shots were fired.

A load of hay toppled over on Kent-st. one day last week owing to the runners on one side sinking in the soft snow thrown out from the side ditches.

The cleaning gang speedily repaired the damage and sent the farmer on his way rejoicing.

Mr. Eugene Fee, dealer in pressed hay and straw, reports the demand for those things as being far in excess of the supply. The north country is asking daily for car lots, and if the present blockade is not soon raised the effect on the northern villages must necessarily be serious.

Peterboro Morning Times: The Water-st. canal is now open for business. The pavements are all the way from two to ten inches under water.

Some of Lindsay's parents have also been built too low. There is one satisfaction however, they will not float away with the spring freshets like the old plank walks.

The townspeople may not build much hogs on all the wood they will receive from the farmers for the balance of the season, as the roads will be simply impassable for this forward until the snow disappears.

Many farmers are finding difficulty in getting into the bush to keep enough wood on hand to supply their own wants.

Notwithstanding the various kinds of weather we are having, men are engaged daily on the C.P.R. construction work in town. The heavy bank of earth purchased from Mr. Gowden has almost entirely been transferred to the road bed. Mr. B. Scully in charge of a gang of men is now operating in the vicinity of Dovey's mill, and another gang is at work back of Beall's tannery.

Already a feeling of activity and unrest is perceptible in the hen coops. The cackle of the birds is wafted as sweet music on the early morning breeze, and chattering, as head of the household, is already keeping his eyes open with a view to locating proper sites whereon to start housekeeping operations. These and other indications all tend in the same direction viz., that the days of the forty cent eggs are numbered.

Mr. Will Corscadden, of Whitewood, Assa., who has been visiting his parents here for the past few weeks, returned to his western home Tuesday. Mr. Corscadden is one of the many young men from this district who has made farming a success in the prairie province. He has been there for the past seven years and is the owner of two half-sections of land as good as the sun shines on.

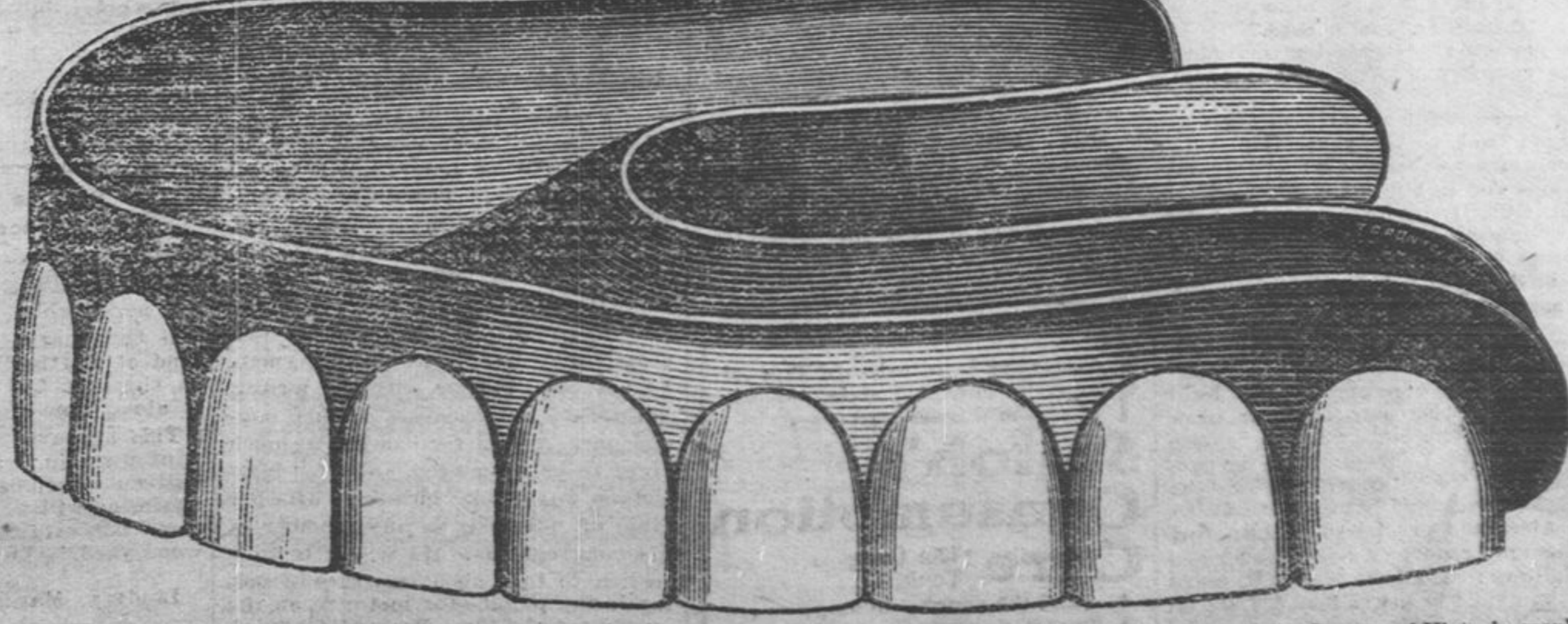
