Toronto News: The Midland branch of the Grand Trunk is so blocked with snow that the students of the University of Cobocook fear they cannot reach home for Easter.

Mr. John Bartram, Toronto, chairman of the Dominion Transportation Commission, has written to Mayor Rogers, of Peterboro, suggesting March 24th as the date for the proposed meeting of the Commission in that town in connection with the Trent Valley Canal.

Hay is coming in freely these days in response to a brisk demand and the fear that the roads will get worse before they get better. Two small owners, heavy men and hotel-keepers are having their mows and from 10 to 15 loads are weighed daily on the market scales.

Grey County reports the heaviest aggregate snow this season, Pockyn having had 155 inches, Owen Sound 111 inches, Meaford 160 inches. Bruce comes next with 123 inches at Saugeen, 90 at Point Clark, 75 at Warton. Muskoka reports 106 inches at Beatrice, 118 at Bala, and 99 at Gravenhurst.

The "Salada" Tea Company has opened a branch in Minneapolis, with Mr. Weaver as manager. The "Salada Tea Co. have now branches in Toronto, Montreal, New York, Chicago, Buffalo, Detroit, Pittsburg, Boston and Philadelphia, and from these branches do an enormous business from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

Over 2,000 telegraph poles have been taken out by Mr. Knapping's camp at McGill's bush, South Ops, this winter. Peter McCabe, the champion chopper, and the Palfrey boys, were in the gangs. The poles ran from 25 to 65 ft. in length. They are now being assorted and shipped out.

In the Northwest, where wool is very scarce and has to be brought long distances, prices are lower than in Lindsay, although we are practically on the edge of the forests. Dry lambs are quoted in the Winnipeg Free Press as selling at \$5.75 per cord, while \$6 and \$6.25 was paid on Kent-st. a couple of weeks ago.

The right of way of the L. B. & P. R. R. which has been used as a sleigh road during the winter, has been closed by order for the balance of the season. The public in the section, north of Nestleton will suffer a great inconvenience in consequence, as the country roads not being traveled, will now have to be opened up.

At the last regular meeting of the A.O.U.W. a large number of members turned out and assisted in the initiation of candidates. During the course of the meeting rousing speeches were delivered by different members present. Refreshments were served and gramophone selections closed an excellent evening's amusement.

There was some unexpected fun at Meehnan's sale in Ops on Tuesday last. Two fur coats got mixed up at a town hotel at dinner time, with the result that the owners got mixed up in a cowshed scrap at Meehnan's barn. One of the farmers wedged the other in a manger, branding him about the face. The performance was witnessed by a full house. The Mariposa man is now wearing the better coat.

As a sample of the difficulties that had to be faced by some of the lumbering companies operating in Haliburton county during the past winter, it is said that Messrs. Mickle & Dymont and the Gull River Co. were compelled to slash and open out a road eighteen miles long through the townships of Anson and Oakley in order that their camps might be kept supplied with hay and beef, by the farmers of Stanhope, Minden, and adjoining townships.

Peterboro bankers have agreed to receive no more American silver after April 1st. The Examiner says: Heretofore the banks have lost on American silver, as it has to be shipped to New York. Then as money is inferior to the Canadian silver currency, and moreover, Dominion silver is on no consideration accepted anywhere in the United States.

There is apparently a large quantity of American silver in circulation around town, and this action on the part of the banks will have a tendency to banish it from Peterboro at least, for ever. Lindsay bankers should follow suit. We belittle ourselves in the estimation of all Americans when we continue to accept their silver currency despite the

Railway Notes. A rumor is current in town that the C. P. R. has acquired possession of the Irondale & Bancroft road and charter, that the L. B. & P. R'y will be extended north from Bobcaygeon to a junction with it, and that the I. B. & O. line will be continued.

On Wednesday, as the Haliburton train was on its way down to Lindsay, a couple of cars of freight left the track owing to ice on the rails, and some damage was done. The auxiliary had to be sent out, and it was after one o'clock to-day when the train pulled into Lindsay.

The complete blockade of the Haliburton line, which has lasted since the great storm of Feb. 29th, was raised yesterday afternoon. The work train reached the village about 4 o'clock, and the entire village turned out to greet the deliverers. A passenger train was sent north at 7:30 o'clock to convey the large number of travellers held here for many days to their homes along the line. The cost to the G. T. R. of the tie-up will run into large figures.

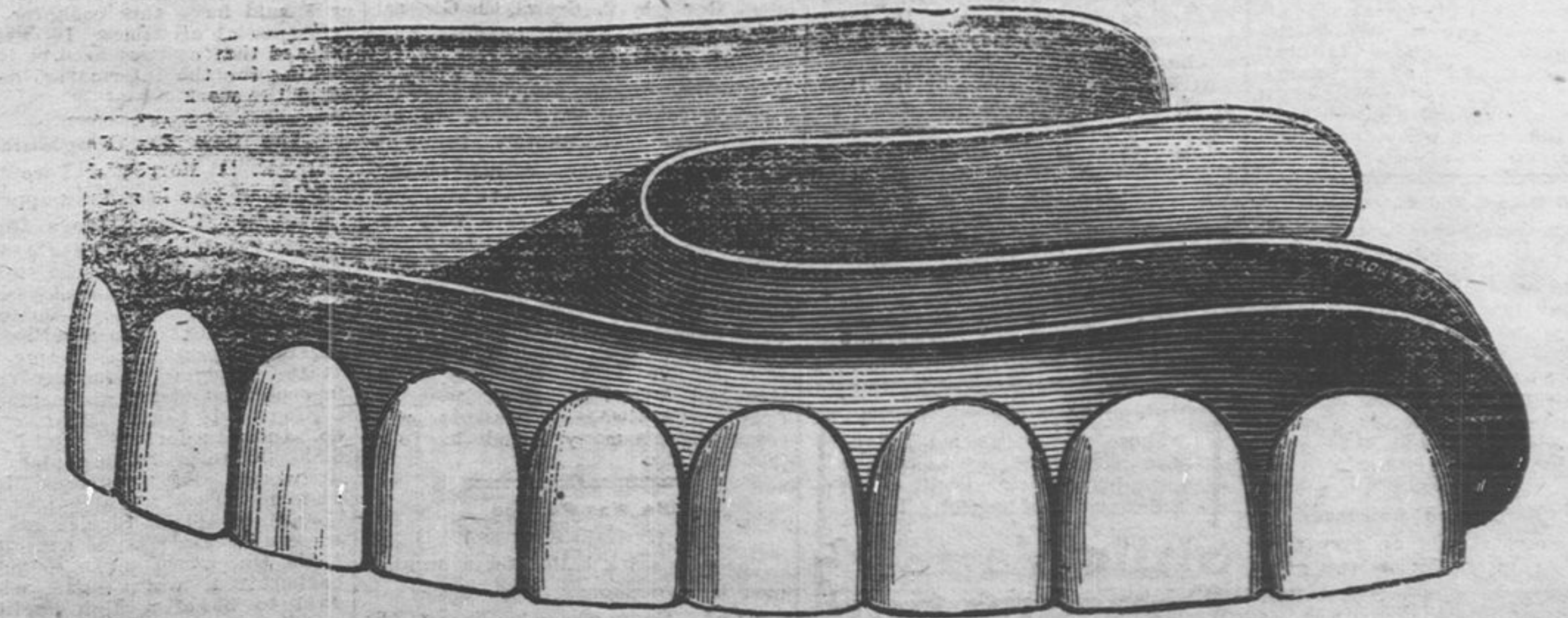
