Exhibit Arrives at the Fair. A St. Louis despatch says: Five carloads of exhibits from different rarts of Canada have arrived in St Louis. A car of fruit has also been rlaced in cold storage awaiting shipment. The exhibits already arrived include the rick of Canada's agricultural, forest and mineral wealth. Commissioner General Wm. Hutchison is authority for the statement that the Canadian disclay at natural wealth reculiar to Canada, prove beneficial. or rather those not found in the other countries making exhibits. For example, in minerals, Canada's almost exclusive resources of nickel, corundum, chrome iron, peat and asbestos are to be featured. The discases, but unique and striking disclays will also be made. Separate gyramids of asbestos, mica and nickel are to be built and placed in prominers. These pyramids will illustrate the processes the ores undergo in the transition from the crude state to

the finished product. The nickel ryramid is to be 20 feet in height.
