THE REGULATIONS FOR LENT

CIRCULAR ISSUED BY HIS LORDSHIP BISHOP O'CONNOR, PETERBORO, To the Faithful of the Diocese—When and How to Fast. The circular of His Lordship, Bishop O'Connor, concerning regulations for the holy time of Lent was read in St. Mary's church on Sunday at both masses. The following are the Diocesan regulations for Lent: 1.—All days in Lent, Sundays excepted, are fasting days, on which only one full meal is allowed, with a morsel in the morning, and a collection or light repast in the evening. 2.—Those exempted from fasting are: All persons under twenty-one and those over sixty years of age; likewise the sick and infirm, women carrying or nursing infants, and all who are engaged in hard labor. These may take their usual number of meals every day in Lent. 3.—The law of abstinence from flesh meat, which forms part of the penitential discipline of Lent, obliges all who are over seven years of age. 4.—By virtue of power granted us by Apostolic Indult, we permit the use of flesh meat at each meal on Sundays, and once a day on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, except the Saturday after the first Sunday in Lent and Holy Saturday. 5.—Fish and shellfish are not allowed at the same meals. 6.—The use of milk, butter, cheese and eggs is allowed on all days. 7.—The use of tripe and lard is allowed in the preparation of food on all days except Good Friday. 8.—All who are exempt from fasting should abstain from meat on the days prescribed, be more constant in prayer, give alms more abundantly, and abstain from all pleasures and amusements with greater exactness, so as to live up to the spirit of penance and self-denial that should mark the holy season of Lent. Should any further relaxation of the fast or abstinence be required by particular persons, they may obtain it from their respective pastors, who are hereby authorized to grant it, provided true and sufficient cause be assigned. The yearly commemoration of the forty days' fast of our Divine Lord in the desert reminds us of our duty to imitate our Redeemer, and also encourages us to perform salutary penance in expiation of our sins. "In penance you do penance you shall all likewise perish" (Luke xii. 5). Many are so taken up with the things of this life that they pay too little attention to the "one thing necessary." Yet this "one thing necessary," namely, the saving of our souls, is the part which God laid in creating us, and which Christ had in redeeming us; and it should be the great duty of our lives to keep us true to the will of God and His justice, and all these things shall be added unto you. (Matt. vi. 33). It is not enough to believe that Jesus died for our sins; we must also believe that we are worthy of the sacrifice of the Mass and the Sacraments. We exhort you therefore, dearly beloved brethren, to make use at all times, but especially during the holy season of Lent, of those means which God has provided for our souls, and your disposal. "Behold now is the day of salvation." (2 Cor. vi. 2).
