EDITORIAL NOTES.

The lean sharks in Toronto must be indeed greedy. A witness has testified that he was charged 125 per cent.

If pig iron can be produced for \$3 a ton less by electricity than by the blast furnace process, there will be an early revolution in the industry.

The British Commons has declared for the principle of paying members \$1,500 a year, but no legislative effect will yet be given to the motion made. The majority of yeas was 238.

Mr. Blair arguing before the Railway Commission, of which he was once chief, is perhaps another proof of the fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the real "Master of the Administration" — the Mail to the contrary.

The other day the wires brought us news of a big cyclone devastating the Society Islands causing a loss of 10,000 lives. Now it is learned that there really was a cyclone, and one life was lost. Surely, the "yellow" headquarters have been discovered.

Mr. Colquhoun, the new Deputy Minister of Education, has no reason to grumble at his employers' generosity. They have raised the salary of the job to \$3,000—\$500 more than this long experienced and capable predecessor got. And the new man has yet to show that he knows his work. Besides, an expert is to be employed to do it for him.

The conspiracy charges against eight officers of the Dominion Wholesale Grocers' Guild will be resumed at Hamilton to-morrow morning. There is a strong impression in the minds of the people that they have been robbed through the medium of the system of rebates arranged by the Guild between the refineries and the grocers, and no doubt the evidence elicited will be carefully read and weighed.

Montreal Witness: The Conservatives have a splendid leader in Mr. Borden. How a man with his gentlemanly instincts can have part and lot with a party which speaks through such newspapers as its exponents in Toronto, Hamilton, Halifax and other places, it is a little hard to understand. It is plain, however, that, if he had his way, it would be a very much more decent party than it is. Mr. Borden has been advising and encouraging the assembled election reformers of New York on the necessity of reforming their electoral practices, if democracy itself is to be preserved. Mr. Borden exposed and illustrated electoral corruption as it prevails in Canada and showed where our election laws fail and might be improved. What strikes one most in reading his enlightening speech is the obviousness of the things which might be done toward mending the situation, and wonder at the fact that we have not done those things. We ask ourselves why a measure embodying these reforms has not been introduced into parliament either by the government or by the opposition. If the government does not announce a new electoral law in the king's speech, we look to see such a measure brought forward by Mr.

EXPERIMENTS WITH CROPS

CONDUCTED BY GUELPH AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

Varieties Offered for This Season's Planting by Farmers.

The members of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union are pleased to state that for 1908 they are prepared to distribute into every township of Ontario material for experiments with fodder crops, roots, grains, grasses, clovers and fertilizers. Upwards of 1,600 varieties of farm crops have been tested in the Experimental Department of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, for at least five years in succession. These consist of nearly all the Canadian sorts and several hundred new varieties, some of which have done exceedingly well in the carefully conducted experiments at the College and are now being distributed free of charge for co-operative experiments throughout Ontario. The following is the list of co-operative experiments in agriculture for 1908:

- Kohl Rabi and two varieties of fall turnips 3
- Paranais and two varieties of carrots 3
- Three varieties of fodder or silage corn 3
- Three varieties of millet 3
- Three varieties of sorghum 3
- Grass peas and two varieties of vetches 2
- Two varieties of rape 2
- Three varieties of clover 3
- Sainfoin, lucerne and burnet 3
- Seven varieties of grasses 3
- Three varieties of field beans 3
- Three varieties of sweet corn 3
- Fertilizers with corn 3
- Fertilizers with Swedish turnips 3
- Sowing mangolds on the level and in drills 2
- Two varieties of early, medium and late potatoes 2
- Three grain mixtures for grain production 3
- Three mixtures of grasses and clover for hay 3

The size of each plot in each of the first twenty-seven experiments and in Nos. 29 and 30 is to be two rods long by one rod wide, and in No. 28, one rod square.

Each person in Ontario who wishes to join in the work may choose any one of the experiments for 1908, and apply for the same. The material will be furnished in the order in which the applications are received until the supply is exhausted. The first choice will be granted. All material will be furnished entirely free of charge to each applicant, and the produce of the plots will, of course, be the property of the person who conducts the experiment.

What Did Lindsay Lack?

Orillia Times: Lack of sewers has left the town this week a very important industry. A carpet factory had narrowed down its choice of location to two towns, Orillia and Peterboro, with the preference for Orillia. Mayor Miller and Councillor Clark, while in Toronto last week, called upon Mr. Brinton, with whom negotiations have been carried on, and learned that the Company had decided to go to Peterboro solely because Orillia had no sewer system. The concern promises to spend \$50,000 in buildings, exclusive of machinery, and before January, 1907, to employ fifty hands, and within another year to increase the number to one hundred and twenty-five. The short-sightedness of the electors who voted adversely on the sewer plebiscite two months ago is becoming more apparent every day.

LINDSAY IN THE EARLY SIXTIES.

Interesting Extracts from Old Files of The Post, after the Big Fire.

Result of the Elections.

The municipal elections resulted in Mr. Wm. McDonnell being elected Mayor by 38 of a majority, and Councillors Bell, Hoop, Browne, Roche, Dooney, Grace, Dean, Lenihan and Dunsford.

Mariposa elections: Whiteside, Gordon, Hodson, Cameron, Davidson, Opa-Connelly, Pyne, Duck, Farrell, Reid.

Thursday, Jan. 21, 1864—The new Presbyterian church at Cambray was opened last Sabbath by the Rev. Dr. Burns, of Toronto.

Jan. 29—On Monday morning Richard Johnson, of the 2nd company, Mariposa, was found dead in bed.

On Thursday evening, 21st inst., Mr. Cottingham, of Onemee, on the occasion of his being elected for the twenty-first time in succession to represent the first ward in the township of Emily, entertained the electors to an oyster supper. About 200 sat down, and the Lindsay brass band under the leadership of Mr. G. H. Keeve, Jr., entertained the company.

The stockholders of the Port Hope, Lindsay and Beaverton Railway Company held their annual meeting on Tuesday, 9th. The following were elected directors for the current year: Hon. A. A. Burnham, Wm. Clouston, Jas. Stephenson, Thomas White, Jr., G. S. Dainty, R. McKeech, R. Beamish, F. Ferguson, J. B. Fortune.

Feb. 4—Adam Hudspeth, Lindsay, attorney-at-law, has been appointed a notary public in Upper Canada.

This week, owing to good prices being paid for wheat, from 75c to 90c, there has not been less than 10,000 to 12,000 bushels brought to Lindsay, and bought up by the buyers. Great difficulty was experienced in obtaining storage.

The Presbyterian church was opened on Sabbath last by Rev. Alex. Mathieson, D.D., of Montreal. The Rev. Wm. Johnson (the incumbent of the church) expressed his gratitude at seeing so large a congregation, and Rev. John MacMurehy, of Eldon, delivered a discourse in Gaelic.

Mar. 11—Denis Maguire, a resident of Ops, drove his horses into the Scoug river last Tuesday evening. Both horses were lost.

A fatal accident occurred on the Fort Hope and Lindsay Railway on Friday last, by which Mr. Daniel Hayes lost his life. Deceased was engaged in coupling cars, when, not making a proper connection, he was crushed by the collision and death ensued in a few minutes.

April 8—We regret to have to record the death of Mr. O'Neill, wife of Mr. Hugh O'Neill, Ops.

On Thursday last the son of Mr. Alex. McGregor, Fenelon, was accidentally shot, the charge shattering the arm.

Capt. Crandell, the enterprising proprietor of the Str. Woodman, late-year launched another steamer. The new craft is 80 feet long, 14 feet beam, flat-bottomed, and will be fitted up with engines of 28 horse-power.

On Friday last the market-by-law was passed by 114 majority. Specifications and plans will be at once prepared, tenders will be asked for, and the building will soon be commenced.

Mr. Norman Macdonald, of the Cambray hotel, died suddenly last Friday night.

April 29—Early last week the eldest son of Mr. John Lenihan, aged 7 years, was hurried to death, his clothes catching fire while the parents were out.

A man named John Short was killed at Manilla on the 22nd, while chopping down trees on the farm of Mr. Anthony Hill, a tree falling on him.

THE HOUNDING OF DEER.

Settlers Condemn the Practice—City Sports Need the Hounds.

A bill in the Legislature to prevent the hounding of deer may be regarded as the settlers' retort against the general tendency to frame game laws in the interest of sports from the cities. The settlers have naturally regarded the game as their own, and have been inclined to grumble at restraints that preserve the deer for the men from the cities. The early open season has been designed for those who shrink from the hardships of the advancing winter, and the short season is specially the privilege of the city man. The situation is complicated by the generosity of the city sport in hiring the settler for a guide, paying a large board bill without complaint, and buying two deer at a fancy price to attach to his coupons. But the settler feels that he is not getting the full benefits of his position, and consequently favours the bill to prevent hounding.

Without the aid of hounds the average city sport would spend many seasons in the woods before he would kill a deer. If he can watch on the range and shoot the hunted deer during a frightened pause he is doing well indeed. But still-hunting is an art that is acquired only by years of experience in the bush. It requires a training of the eye that cannot be attained in city life. An experienced woodsman can tell the novice by his noise long before he objects to shoot at every moving eagerness to shoot at every moving object makes him much more dangerous to other hunters than to the deer that are warned of his approach. The bill to abolish hounding will be sustained by all humane considerations. It will also give the settler an advantage that few would like to deprive them of. The proposed change is in the direction of all recent changes, as it aims at greater restrictions in preserving the big game of the province.

ON TABLE OF REVOLVING SAW.

Patrick Tangney Had Close Call From Sudden Death.

Mr. Patrick Tangney, who resided on the boundary line between Douro and Ottonabee townships, about four miles from the city, met with a painful accident, while assisting at a sawing line on the farm of Mr. Bradford of Douro. He was carrying wood from the pile to the saw, when the wood began to run. Mr. Tangney was thrown upon the table of the rapidly revolving saw, and came within an ace of being badly cut. As it was his cheek was grazed. His feet were caught between several sticks of wood and before it could be extricated, his right leg was broken in three places. He was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, where his injuries, which were severe, were attended to. It will be several weeks before Mr. Tangney will be able to be around.—Review.

COUNTY POLICE COURT.

Magistrate McWayn is Being Kept Busy—Case of Illegal Liquor Selling.

From Evening Post of March 12: Evidently the Government are determined to put a stop to illegal selling in the Province for they have detectives abroad, one of whom paid a visit to this County last week, having received information that certain people who were keeping hotel were selling liquor without a license. The detective obtained a search warrant from Police Magistrate McWayn and searched five of such places in Mariposa and Fenelon, where local option is in existence, and he succeeded in discovering liquor in one of these, under such circumstances that showed it evidently had been kept for sale. This was at Mr. An-Cil Walton's hotel, Oakwood, and upon being charged with the offence he was fined the maximum amount, \$50, (it being his first offence), and costs, \$4.50 at the Court House last Friday.
