

to the fact that a terrible plague is raging in its midst; a plague which is destroying more life than all other plagues in the world combined; a plague that finds 90 per cent. of its victims among those in the prime of life, when they are of the greatest value to civilization. That plague is consumption, the "White Death." Should smallpox, leprosy or any other loathsome disease destroy onetenth as many beings as are killed by consumption, the country would be thrown into a panic, business would be at a standstill, and the frightened populace would fleee out of the zone of the deadly scourge. Yet the white plague is killing one person in every three above The age of Lifteen without causing any special terror. Friends and relatives die around us like flies, but we are not alarmed, probably because death from consumption is not sudden; the end can be seen approaching for months, and maybe for years, and gradually the victim withers away. It is a sudden death that strikes us hard. But we are awakening. Even if a

death from consumption does not rend our hearts as does a death due to knife, pistol or other violent means, still we cannot be blind to the bald fact that consumption is indeed a plague, and that something should be done to check its ravages.
