She was standing near a revolving shaft which caught her dress and wound her up on the shaft, her head striking on two hoppers which stood on each side of the shaft as she was

Before employes could shut down the mill, part of her skull was torn off. She was quite dead before they could get her released from the shaft.

ing the benzine fumes. The whole tank of benzine exploded, blowing Leith out into the yard. He was not very badly injured, but the other three men who were penned in the building were very seriously, though not fatally injured.
