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WOMAN QUITE DEAD

Part of Her Skull Torn Off By a Revolving Shaft.

MILLER'S WIFE'S AWFUL END

Mrs. Thornwhite, Wife of the Proprietor of the Vienna Grist Mills, Was Caught by Revolving Shaft by Her Dress and Wound Up to the Top, Her Head Striking on Two Hoppers on Each Side.

Vienna, March 10.—Mrs. Charles Thornwhite, wife of the proprietor of the grist mill here, was killed yesterday. She was standing near a revolving shaft which caught her dress and wound her up on the shaft, her head striking on two hoppers which stood on each side of the shaft as she was carried around.

Before employees could shut down the mill, part of her skull was torn off. She was quite dead before they could get her released from the shaft.

BENZINE TANK EXPLODES.

Four Hamilton Workmen Badly Burned and Battered.

Hamilton, March 10.—Four men were hurt last evening about 7 o'clock at F. W. Bird & Sons roofing paper factory in the annex, and a small building was wrecked by the explosion of a tank of benzine.

The men were engaged in a little brick building, about 15 feet square, in which benzine was stored in two tanks. They were mixing benzine with a preparation used for roofing paper.

They had a lantern, and one of the men, John Leth, saw that it was beginning to splutter. He grabbed and started for the door, but was not quick enough to prevent it from igniting the benzine fumes.

The whole tank of benzine exploded, blowing Leth out into the yard. He was not very badly injured, but the other three men who were present, the building were very seriously, though not fatally injured.

The explosion practically blew the whole building down, and the men were battered by the flying bricks and pieces of iron, badly burned about the face and arms.

The injured are: Supt. Fisher, 211 South James street; J. Hainsworth, 297 North James street, and Hugh Reid, 211 Charles street. All were taken to the city hospital.

Crushed to Death.

St. John, N. B., March 10.—In the Oseman plaster quarries at Hillsboro, N. B., yesterday, Richard Milton was crushed to death by cave-in in the tunnel, in which he worked. A large quantity of plaster, which fell, buried him several feet deep.

St. John, N. B., March 10.—While in pursuit of a flock of ducks near a city yesterday Jarvis Harrington, a lad 14 years old, was terribly shot in the arm and side. He was creeping along when he saw a duck, and he fired behind him, when it went off. The right arm was shattered to bits. The boy lies at the point of death.

Snow Avalanche Kills 21. Trondheim, Norway, March 10.—A snow avalanche at the Lofoten Islands Thursday night buried a number of fishermen's huts. Rescuers extricated twenty-one dead and thirty-nine injured.

TO CRUSH NATION'S FOES.

"Black Hundred" Agitates For the Extermination of the Jews.

St. Petersburg, March 10.—The fears of the renewal of Jewish massacres at Easter, to which a deputation recently called Premier Witte's attention, appear upon investigation to have real foundation.

The "Black Hundred" organizations are conducting an agitation to slaughter the "enemies of Russia."

Circulars have been prepared in St. Petersburg calling for the extermination of the Jews. At Minsk the society has had the temerity to address a request to the Premier for permission to crush the nation's foes.

The Premier immediately notified the Governor-General of Minsk to take measures to prevent any reactionary officials and police who regard the Jews as the inciters of the late revolution are doing nothing.

The members of the deputation which called on the Premier were generally alarmed. The local authorities, the deputation, are closing their eyes with the result that the Jewish population is threatened with more dreadful outrages than those of last fall.

Thirty Women Storm "C. B."

London, March 10.—A band of thirty zealous women suffragettes attempted to storm Premier Campbell-Bannerman's official residence on Downing street yesterday afternoon. They used the knocker vigorously and attempted to force an entrance when the door was opened. Three ring-leaders of the women were taken to the nearest police station, struggling and screaming and followed by 27 of their companions shouting: "Down with the C.-B." and other cries. "C.-B." otherwise Premier Campbell-Bannerman, was presiding at a Cabinet Council at the time the woman called and he refused to see them.

Honor Prof. Macallum.

Toronto, March 10.—Prof. A. B. Macallum, F.R.S., was presented with an illuminated address by the medical undergraduates yesterday afternoon at the regular meeting of the Medical Society in the new building. The address was in recognition of the recently conferred fellowship in the Royal Society.

Quebec Legislature Closed.

Quebec, March 10.—The second session of the eleventh Legislature of Quebec was prorogued at 8.30 o'clock last night by Lieut.-Governor Jette, who gave the royal assent to 114 bills passed during the session and closed both houses with a speech from the throne.

Sir Charles Tupper Improved.

Victoria, B. C., March 10.—Sir Charles Tupper's physicians late yesterday afternoon announced that should present progress be maintained the patient should be convalescent within a fortnight.

KLEINGBELL MURDER CASE.

During Daughter's Evidence Old Man Broke Down and Cried.

Belleville, March 10.—The preliminary investigation into the Kleingbell murder case began in the police court here before Magistrate Flint yesterday afternoon. Intense interest was manifested in the case, and the court room was crowded.

William Little, told of his discovery of the crime, and how he had informed the author, Yeomans, who was first called to the injured woman, told of how he had visited her and how old Kleingbell had said he pounded her with his fists because she was "sassy"; he also told that they had quarreled over their son, Herman, who, the old fellow said, was not his son.

Drs. Gibson and Boyce, who conducted the postmortem, gave technical descriptions of the woman's injuries, which, they said, caused death and could not have been inflicted.

Mrs. Dulmage, daughter of the Kleingbells, was the object of much sympathy as she gave her testimony. She sobbed all the time, and the old prisoner broke down and cried as his daughter told of finding her mother in a dying condition. Her father told her that he and her mother quarreled, her mother was saucy and he beat her. Drink, he said, was the cause of it. He also spoke of her brother Herman.

Herman Kleingbell was a new witness. He testified that before he left home, years ago, he had known his father to abuse his mother, both with his tongue and his fists.

The old man grew excited as his son gave this testimony, and afterwards denied it to the police magistrate.

At 4.30 the hearing was adjourned till Tuesday morning next. Very little sympathy is expressed for Kleingbell, especially among those who know him best.

BANQUETTED AT BRANTFORD.

Prof. Graham Bell is a Guest of the Telephone City.

Brantford, March 10.—More than 200 attended the annual banquet of the Brantford Board of Trade at the Kibby House last night.

The principal attraction was Prof. Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone, who delivered an address in which he outlined the events leading up to his invention in 1874 and the first transmission of speech over actual wires in 1876.

He declared Brantford was the home of the telephone, and that the first actual transmission had occurred here.

HIS BRIDE A WIDOW.

George A. Sherriff, Who Married Miss Fulford, Dead After Operation.

Brookville, March 10.—George A. Sherriff, son-in-law of the late Hon. Senator Fulford, died at 4 o'clock yesterday morning.

He had not been in good health for several months, but was only in the hospital a few days. Montreal specialists and local physicians performed an operation in the hope of saving his life, but it was of no avail.

He was married on Jan. 10 of this year to Miss Martha Ford, youngest daughter of the late Senator Fulford. He was a member of the Brookville Football Club in 1900, when the team won every match in the Quebec Rugby Union. He was also an expert oarsman. Mr. Sherriff had spent the past three years in New York, holding the position of auditor of the New York, Ontario and Western Railway.

To Stand His Trial.

Ripley, March 10.—The preliminary inquiry into the charges against Geo. Fierman was held in the Town Hall yesterday afternoon before a bench of magistrates. Fletcher was committed to stand his trial on two different charges; of stealing a barber's hydraulic chair, a mirror, about one dozen razors, two sets of hair clippers, and other paraphernalia of a barber's outfit, the property of Angus McLean, whose place was burned, and of stealing double and single harness from George Brooks, Township of Huron.

Rain Maker For the Yukon.

Dawson, March 10.—Charles Hatfield, rainmaker, of Los Angeles, California, has been engaged to produce rainfall here next summer, and is to receive \$10,000 from the Canadian Government if he induces the clouds to give up enough water to supply the needs of miners in this section.

Woman Who Won't Talk.

Three Rivers, March 9.—Mrs. Sclater yesterday resolutely refused to say a word. Before she could be examined, counsel for McCraw, who is on trial for the murder of her husband, demanded to know whether she believed in God, to see whether she was fit for a witness. She simply and repeatedly declined to answer, and was promptly sent down by Justice Cannon for contempt of court, to stay in jail until she should become more communicative. Mrs. Skeene was then put in the box, and to Mr. Guerin told in detail the story of the fatal night.

Forged Mining Certificates.

London, March 9.—Harry Samuel Simons and Franklin Everhart, Americans, were arrested here yesterday and were each remanded in \$10,000 bail on charges of conspiracy and obtaining large sums of money by fraud. The prisoners are described as stock and share brokers, are alleged to have issued forged shares and certificates in connection with Alaska, Oklahoma, Cripple Creek and Manitoba mining companies.

Auto Kills Marchioness.

Rome, March 9.—The Marchioness of Corsini, formerly Princess Harberini, was killed last night by the overturning of an automobile, in which she was riding with her husband, who is King Victor Emmanuel's master of horse. The marchioness, who was 62 years of age, was driving the automobile, her husband, aged 69 years, sitting beside her. The maquis and the chauffeur escaped without a scratch.

Forestry Journal Wanted.

Ottawa, March 10.—E. Stewart has been elected president of the Forestry Association, and H. M. Price, vice-president. Yesterday morning a deputation from the Canadian Forestry Association asked the Prime Minister for further Government aid towards forestry work. One of the objects aimed at is the publication of a monthly journal.

EXPORTS FALL OFF

Britain Does Not Take So Much of Our Goods As Formerly.

FRANCE AND U. S. INCREASE

Deputy Minister Parmelee, in the Report of the Department of Trade and Commerce For the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, Notes An Apparent Falling Off in Aggregate Trade of Canada of \$2,500,000.

Ottawa, March 10.—The report of the Department of Trade and Commerce for the fiscal year, ending June 30, was issued yesterday.

In it Deputy Minister Parmelee notes an apparent falling off in the aggregate trade of Canada of two and a half millions. Imports for the period increased \$7,600,000, but there was a decline of \$10,200,000 in exports, \$5,700,000 being there was a considerable increase in the imports from France and the United States.

Canada's exports to Great Britain fell off considerably, and those to Germany and Holland moderately, while there was an increase of four millions in exports to the United States. During the year there was a decline of \$5,100,000 in grain exports, \$5,700,000 being wheat, cheese fell off four millions, bacon one million, and apples two millions.

There was an increase in export butter of a million and a quarter, a million in canned meats, eight hundred thousand in animals and a like amount in wood manufactures.

The buoyancy of Canada's revenue was well maintained during the eight months which ended on Feb. 28. The total receipts were \$49,740,475. This is an excess of twelve and a half million dollars in the ordinary receipts over ordinary revenue, and of over four and a half millions in ordinary receipts over all expenditures combined. The revenue exceeds that of the same time last year by \$1,255,795, and the expenditure by \$1,670,983 and the surplus for the same period of the preceding fiscal year. There has been a healthy increase in receipts from all sources.

Proceedings in the House. Preparatory to next week's more serious business the House dealt yesterday with several small matters of a routine character. There was a full attendance, which might be taken to indicate that the heavy penalty for absence provided in last year's bill is having its effect.

On Sir Wilfrid Laurier's motion the following were appointed a committee to nominate select standing committees for the session: Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Mr. Borden, Hon. William Paterson, Hon. Charles Hays, Hon. John Haggart, Mr. W. S. Calvert, and Mr. George Taylor.

The Premier laid on the table the order-in-Council and commission for the insurance law. Mr. Foster asked as to certain returns ordered last session, and Mr. Hyman and Mr. Oliver, whose departments were concerned, promised them for Monday.

In reply to Mr. Foster, Sir Wilfrid said that he had spoken to the Auditor-General and part of his report would be ready on Monday and the rest in a few days.

The House adjourned at 3.20 p. m. Opposition Leadership in the Senate. Conservative Senators met in caucus yesterday morning and unanimously requested Sir Mackenzie Bowell to reconsider his decision to resign the leadership. He will take a few days to think it over. The fact that a serious split exists between the Conservative Senators and Commons is becoming more and more apparent.

GOVERNMENT MAY FALL.

One Rumor Says it May Be Summarily Dismissed.

Victoria, B. C., March 10.—The fate of the Government was trembling in the balance last night. The Kalen Island investigation committee has brought in a whitewashing report but the minority, consisting of James A. Macdonald, Opposition leader, and Mr. W. Patterson submitted a minority report which was published Thursday night, the Government refusing to permit its submission to the House. This report is an exhaustive and masterly summing up of facts.

The Lieutenant-Governor has secured copies of these resolutions, and there are all kinds of rumors afloat regarding the probable dismissal of the Government.

Mining Institute Officers.

Quebec, March 10.—The Canadian Mining Institute elected these officers yesterday: President, George R. Smith, Theford Mines, Que.; vice-presidents, for one year, Dr. F. D. Adams, Montreal; Major R. G. Leckie, Temagami, Ont. for two years, Frederick Kuffer, Greenwood, B. C.; G. Herrick Duggan, Sydney, C. B.; treasurer, J. Stevenson Brown, Montreal; secretary, H. Mortimer Lamb, Montreal.

M. Sarrien Asks Time.

Paris, March 10.—President Fallieres received Jean Sarrien, former Minister of Justice, yesterday afternoon and offered him the task of forming a Cabinet.

The latter said that he would not give the president his final answer until he had consulted with his friends.

Canada's May Tender.

Ottawa, March 10.—Australia is calling for tenders for a fifteen to seventeen knot steamship service fortnightly between Australia and Great Britain. At the present time a subsidy of \$120,000 is being paid. Specifications have been forwarded for the benefit of Canadians who wish to tender. The Archdeacon O'Brien is Dead.

Halifax, N. S., March 10.—Archbishop O'Brien, head of the Roman Catholic Church in Nova Scotia, died last night of apoplexy. He was sixty-three years old, and was consecrated Archbishop of Halifax in 1883. He was a member of the Royal Society of Canada.

Death Sentence Commuted.

Trenton, N. J., March 10.—The sentence of death imposed upon Mrs. Anforts the Tolla, the Bergen County murderess for the killing of Joseph Sontz, was yesterday commuted to 71-3 years imprisonment by the court of pardons.
