Gavernment Was Pressed to Enlarge Companies! Powers.

Hen. Mr. Fielding's Absence Prevented Its Submission-Officers of Companies Asked For Extension of Limit For Investments-Only One Company Satisfied With Present Powers -The Insurance Invesigation.

Ottawa, March 24.-When the insurance investigation opened yesterday morning Mr. Shepley read a memo, produced by Mr. Fitzgerald, sent to the department by the Canada Insurance Association through President McKay and Secretary Bradshaw in 1903, asking that the powers of insurance companies in regard to investments be increased, and that they be allowed to invest in bonds of coal, electric railway and electrical manufacturing, and iron and steel companies, all of which had been successful enterprises.

In a letter dated Feb. 7th, 1983, from Hon. W. S. Flelding to Mr. McCabe, the former said he had given consideration to the representations of the life insurance companies recently submitted to him with respect to an enlargement of their investment powers. He thought it might be possible to grant power to invest in some further securities, which by actual experience might prove to be of a satisfactory character.
