Tangier, March 25.—Despatches from Morocco City say that the killing by a mob of Dr. Mauchamp, who was connected with the French Geodotic Mission, was followed by a general attack upon the Europeans besieged in their houses, and that the British consular agent was forced to fire and killed two persons. The pasha finally sent troops to
