MR. F. J. GILLESPIE HONORED

ON THE EVE OF HIS DEPARTURE FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Presented With an Address on Behalf of Many Lindsay Friends.

On the evening previous to his leaving for Vancouver, to assume the duties of British Columbia manager for the Excelsior Life Co., Mr. F. J. Gillespie was made the recipient of an address in testimony of the esteem entertained for him by many of our leading citizens. The presentation took place in the Benson house parlors. Mr. R. J. McLaughlin, K. C., presided as chairman, and Senator Geo. McHugh, Mayor Sootheran, Lieut.-Col. Sylvester, Mr. James Graham, Mr. John Short, and others, were in attendance. Chairman McLaughlin in a neat speech voiced the regret felt by all at Mr. Gillespie's impending departure, and predicted that in a few years the world would be heard of in the political arena of the West. Mr. Jas. Graham read the address, which was as follows:

Lindsay, April 1st, 1904.

Dear Mr. Gillespie: Having learned that you are about to leave the fair Province of Ontario for British Columbia, we congratulate you on your accession to the noble array of those who are destined to suffer the optimistic opinions of our western possessions to sever the ties for a time, at least, of comradeship and acquaintances which have hitherto bound you to the people of this town and county, and seek to form new comrades and new acquaintances in our vast westerly Province.

But while we desire to offer you our congratulations and express our sorrow at the loss of so good a citizen. Before coming to our town you were well known to many of our prominent citizens, having been engaged in business in a neighboring County where you viewed the County's interest as your own interest, where you always took an active part in promoting all that you believed to be for the County's prosperity, and you were generally speaking correct in your views. So respected and esteemed were you that the municipal electors of your Township selected you to sit in the County Council for several consecutive terms, where your energy and abilities were ever being towards benefiting the entire County in general and your own municipality in particular.

You ever took an active interest in politics and your genial and convincing manner of discussing them won for you the respect of opponents and the confidence of your political friends to such a degree as to secure for you the Reform nomination for County a few years ago, and though unsuccessful your manly and upright manner in conducting your campaign raised you to a higher plane in the estimation and respect of both your party and your fellow citizens. Your removal from Ontario County to Victoria County naturally severed ties of friendship which existed between the people of that district and yourself, but your genial and cheerful disposition quickly raised up for you many new friends here. This is assuring to us now, as we know that the quantities which won for you our esteem will have a like effect upon the people you meet in the far West. From the time you took your place of business here you took an earnest and active interest in the Town's prosperity, and when you required therefrom you carried with you the best wishes of your fellow citizens. You never propose to remove far away from our midst, yet while we regret our loss we extend to you our best wishes, and hope that success will crown your persevering efforts and that prosperity shall be yours.—Signed,

Short addresses were delivered by Mayor Sootheran, Mr. Graham, Mr. Brady, Mr. R. P. Spratt and Mr. J. V. McNulty. Mr. J. A. Gillogly then contributed a song, after which Mr. McLaughlin referred at some length to Mr. Gillespie's record as a citizen of Ontario and Victoria Counties. In 1884, when in business in Uptergrove in the former County, he had been induced to run for the deputy-reverendship of the township and so valuably was his work in the County Council that he was elected to the office the last four years ago, and was elected Warden of the County in 1894. In 1895 he contested the riding in the Liberal interest against Major J. A. McGilvray, Conservativa, in a three-cornered fight, but was unsuccessful owing to the unexpected support given by the Patron candidate. His energetic campaign aroused much admiration, which culminated in a public gathering and the presentation to Mr. Gillespie of a complimentary address and a purse of \$200 in gold. The following year he retired from the County Council in order to give his entire attention to his business, and again his decision brought together a still larger gathering of friends. On this occasion he was presented with a magnificent gold watch suitably engraved, and bearing the name of Hon. W. M. James, A. P. Cockburn, President of Muskoka Navigation Co., and several other influential friends. Again in 1900, on the eve of his departure from Uptergrove, Mr. Gillespie received another evidence of esteem in the form of a similar case, ready engraved, and Mrs. Gillespie was presented with a silver tea service. These evidences of regard were a proof that Mr. Gillespie was possessed of qualities which would win him esteem anywhere, and would no doubt speedily raise up for him many devoted friends in the Western land to which he was going, taking with him the best wishes of a host of Lindsay friends.

Mr. Gillespie made a suitable reply, thanking his friends for the address and the kind things said of him. He had greatly enjoyed his stay among the hospital and kind people of Lindsay, whom he would long remember.

The Winter of 1888. Those who are dreading a late spring may find comfort in the fact that winter has frequently delayed its departure later than it apparently means to this year. Harry Solley informs the Uxbridge Journal representative that on April 26th, 1888, when he left Uxbridge on a trip to the West, snow banks were still visible on the road, and only in a few favorite spots had seeding commenced. From North Bay there was still nothing but ice and snow visible on Lake Nipissing. When he reached Port Arthur it was snowing, and on the station platform he measured six inches of snow. The harbor there was not clear until May 23rd. It is scarcely likely that this spring will break a record like that.

Fatal Accident.

Minden Echo: On Saturday last, Messrs. James and John Cowan, sons of John Cowan, esq., Blairhampton, were felling timber for firewood, and having chopped one side of the tree were sawing the other side when a gust of wind caught the top of the tree they were cutting, twisting it and splitting the tree up for several feet, when it broke off and in falling struck Mr. James Cowan on the breast, killing him instantly. The deceased was a highly respected steady man, 37 years of age and unmarried. His death is a heavy blow to his parents and universal sympathy is felt for them in their sad bereavement. The funeral took place on Wednesday at the Twelve-Mile lake cemetery, and was largely attended.
