But Dominion Government May Pay Off the Principal at Any Time If It So Desires-Amount Involved Is \$1,-910,000-Province May Appeal to Supreme Court and Privy Council - Local Court Judges.

Toronte, April 10 .- In the Ontario held that the Dominion can discharge and pay off the principal sum of \$1,-910,000 at any time. On the last point the province, added Hon. Mr. Matheson, would probably appeal. The capital sum is made up of the general school fund, the Upper Canada building fund and the land improvement fund. Five per cent. has been paid on the amount since Confederation, but in the last year of the Ross administration the Dominion Government notified the province that they would pay only 4 per cent. and last year's payment was made at that rate. The late Government at once instituted proceedings, of which Justice Burbidge's decision is the result. One per cent. difference in the rate means
