The "Neopawah," the Largest Boat Ever

Seen at That Port.

Port Hope Guide: The steamer "Neopawah" arrived in Port on Saturday morning—the first boat to make an appearance here this season. The "Neopawah" is one of the newest and largest Lake Superior line, and came down from Glasgow, where it was built. It is without exception the largest boat ever seen in this port being 220 feet in length, with a 40-foot beam. The boat is an arched structure, and is fitted up with the latest appliances. It has a capacity of 1000 tons, and travels along the coast at the rate of eight miles an hour, when loaded. It leaves 17 feet of water, and is considered a remarkable vessel.
