CREW HAD NARROW ESCAPE.

Were Rescued From the "Greenland" Just as She Foundered.

St. John's, Nfld., April 1.-The sealing steamer Greenland, which became disabled on the sealing grounds early this week has sunk. All the members of her crew were rescued by the steamers Newfoundland and Erik.

The news of the loss of the Greenland was brought here Friday by the sealing steamer Algerine, which put in here from the sealing grounds with a broken rudder.

The Greenland was abandoned on Tuesday. The gale which accompanied the severe blizzard of last Tuesday and the two following days, repestedly drove her with terrific force against ice floes, with which she was

On Monday an attempt was made to give the vessel steerage way in a sheet of open water, but the sails were blown away and the craft again became helpless. The gale dashed the broken propeller and shaft against the hull and forced open the stern, through which the water made its way

DOES NOT OWN CANADA.

Montreal Journal Utters Note of Warning to Mother Country. Montreal. April 1.-Referring to The London Globe's remark that the ar-

rival of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the middle of the intercolonial conference would be an insult to the mother country and to the other countries, and that such conduct would show that Canada might find a better qualified premier, The Presse says:

"What would those English cockneys say if we were to retort in somewhat the following terms: 'If the mother country has no more consideration for the political struggles and the working of parties which the constitutional system authorizes in Canada, as well as in England, Canada will see to have an ungrateful and unjust mother replaced by something more rational.'

"All the people in Canada, English as well as French, are far from holding such a view, but by dint of foolish things the London politician will finally lead us towards it. Those gentlemen should learn once for all that Canada is not their property, but ours, and that Sir Wilfrid Laurier established that point with great eloquence and clearness before the House last night. Canada never asked for a conference, but ceded to imperial besetting, of which it was the cause. On that point we are in no way indebted to the other colonies, who refused to accept the representations of Canada for another date, although we love and respect them as sisters in every way They wished to have full play. Let them have it; but it is only fair that we should have the same. However,

MAJORITY OF PATIENTS WOMEN Turkish Armenia Visited By a Severe Earthquake.

MUCH DAMAGE IS FEARED

Inhabitants Have Been Rendered Homeless-Obliged to Encamp In Snow-Dreadful Hardships-Loss of Life Not Yet Fully Known-

Town Is Densely Populated, But Not Many Europeons.

Constantinople, April 2.—The report that a severe earthquake, accompanied by loss of life, has occurred at Bitlis appears to be confirmed, but the number of deaths is unknown. Beyond a brief message from the mis-sionaries at Bitlis reporting that the town is badly damaged, that they are homeless and that their people are encamped in the snow, which in places is 25 feet deep, no news of the disaster

has reached this city.

London, April 2.—The situation of Bitlis, which is built on a rocky slope, with houses constructed of stone, having flat, earthen roofs, caused people here to fear that a great amount of damage has been done. It is described as a picturesque, densely populated town, having but few Europeans among the population. A British Vice-consul is stationed there, but at present he is absent on leave. Instructions have already been sent to the local authorities to afford relief to the inhabitants, but there is no doubt that outside help is needed.

PERFECT, PERMANENT

Hand to Hand Fighting Between Peasants and Soldiers - Troops Beaten by Men With Scythes and Forks-Grape Shot and Shells Succeed-Many Riot Leaders Arrested-Whole Villages Were Razed.

Bucharest, April 1.-Field guns loaded with grape shot, according to the official reports, are winning against the revolutionary peasantry, whose arms are mostly hay forks and scythe blades. The insurgents were able to hold

their own against the troops at close quarters and even withstood cavalry charges, doing terrible execution with long pronged forks and scythe blades strapped to long poles, but the slaughter since the troops used artillery ap-pears to be terrifying them into sub-

In the district of Vlashiea, where the outbreak was particularly serious, large numbers of insurgents have surrendered and have denounced their leaders to the authorities with the result that many of the lattter have been arrested. The Government hopes that with the leaders in jail the undisciplined bands will soon abandon the field.
