CHURCH AFTER A THEATRE.

Montreal, April 1.-A sensation has been caused in Roman Catholic circles by the action of Archbishop Yveschei, who, in a pastoral issued yesterday, denounces immemorial theatrical productions in general and names the Theatre Les Nouveaux in particular. The ground of the Archbishop's action in regard to the latter theatre is that it is posted and advertised during Holy Week a play entitled La Ruffale, which he claims is an apology for suicide and which was produced. The Archbishop forbids the faithful to attend the theatre. The same play was produced last year without any objection.

BIG JOB OF WOOD CUTTING.

Indian River Man Doubts Feat of Ennismore Artist. In a recent issue of The Post Mr. W. Curtin, of Ennismore, a wood Sawyer of note, stated that he had cut 40 cords of wood in five hours for an Ops farmer with his machine. There is a woman who can kill coons and bears, but that is play to my hobby. My friend must have had a good shower along with him and he must be a good flier to keep his saw in order to cut that. I have only seen from 6 to 15 cords in a half day, and 15 cords is a big job to do in five hours.
