HOT DEBATE IN THE HOUSE

Mr. Campbell Strongly Supports Bill -Protest Against Invasion of Provincial Rights-Minister of Justice Defines Legal Position-Practically Killed For This Session-Strike In West.

Ottawa, April 23.-It was expected that the Hamilton Radial Electric Railway Company's bill would not be permitted to go through without determined opposition, and expectations were not disappointed. When the bill taken up in the House yesterday Mr. A. Campbell, Chairman of the Railway Committee, claimed that people living within 100 or 200 miles of Toronto should have facilities to be right into the heart of the city. Claude Macdonell vigorously protested against the invasion of Provincial rights attempted under the bill. The Minister of Justice defined the legal position of the matter, referring to a decision of Mr. Justice Street, who had decided that when a street railway crossed a Federal railway it came under the jurisdiction of the Dominion Government. That judgment, said Mr. Aylesworth, was based on a section of the railway act of 1888, and he had been unable to find anything in the British North America Act under which Federal jurisdiction could revert to a Province. Did Not Agree.

The leader of the Opposition did not agree with this interpretation of the law, holding that Mr. Justice Street's decision meant nothing more than that when a street railway crossed a Federail railroad the crossing came under Dominion jurisdiction. The interpretation of the Minister of Justice came as a surprise to the House, and met with vigorous criticism from the Conservative benches. The debate was afterwards practically confined to the Opposition, Mr. Fielding merely interposing to declare that the Government were not responsible for the bill. For a time it seemed as if there would be an all-night session, but at 11 o'clock Mr. Fielding moved to report progress, and immediately afterwards the adjournment carried. The bill may be taken up again on Wednesday or Friday, but as on both days only an hour, will be reserved for private bills, and as there are several other measures on the order paper, the feeling is that the bill is practically killed for the session.

"Questions of grave character and great importance relating to the respective jurisdictions of the Dominion and the province with reference to railway and other corporations have come before you. A measure has been adopted, namely, an act respecting certain railway and other corporations, which, it is hoped, will serve to protect the province from any croachments upon its jurisdiction. "I observe by the terms of the ad-

dress, which you have presented to me, that another grave question has arisen, namely, the claim of the Dominion to assume, for military purposes, and without compensation, certain lands and timber which are the property of the province. In pursuance of the terms of the address, my Ministers will take all necessary steps to protect the interests of the province in that behalf."

His Honor concluded: "In relieving you from your duties. I desire again to express my thanks for the great public service you have rendered, and join with you in expressing hope that the blessing of Almighty man who is alleged to have made the God will continue to rest upon our country and upon our people.
