FRANCHISE FOR GAS PLANT WAS GRANTED BY COUNCIL

Company Will Have Plant in Operation by

At a meeting held last Monda, in Secretary G. H. Hopkins' office, the nembers of Sturgeon Point Council were unanimously in favor of granting a franchise to the Davis Acetykne Co., Ltd., of Ontario, providing the representations made on the company's behalf are borne out.

Mr. Wordsworth. the Company's agent, explained to Reeve J. D. Figweile and Messrs. Brown, Milier and Anderson, the Councillors present. that his firm made a specialty of plants for summer resorts, parky, large hotels, etc., and would like to secure a franchise and instal a plant at Sturgeon Point for the supply of illuminating and heating gas. They would canvas the cottagers for contracts for the season, and would supply gas for lighting and cooking at \$2 per 1000 feet-equal to coal gas at about \$1.35 per 1000 fret. His company would supply 10 street tights of 50 candle power for \$75 for the season, operated on a moonlight schedule, except when otherwise ordered by Council. Ho had visited the village last year and found it admirably adapted for giv-

ing a first-class service. Mr. Flavelle-"Is there any langar connected with the system?" Mr. Wordsworth-"Not at all-it is not like the Burgess plant you had here."
