NOTHING NARROW IN THIS.

Hamilton Methodists recently had the pleasure of hearing some broad christianity preached by a former pastor, Rev. W. S. Griffin, D. D., while addressing which in the latter part of the sermon he said: "The text was 'Search in the Scriptures,' and dealt with the essentials in religion. He deprecated long discourses on side issues, such as baptism, the divinity of the Saviour and His redeeming grace were the great truths; the things to get hold of. Men might differ and still be good Christians. He, as a Methodist, believed in the best form of worship, but he had no quarrel with those who believed in the Presbyterian form. The Methodist would go to heaven; so would the Presbyterian. If a man believed in the teachings of the Baptist church it was right that he should be a Baptist, and the Baptist would go to heaven. If a man found in the ritual and ceremonies of the Episcopal church that which appealed to him and which he desired to worship God, he should belong to that church, and the Episcopalian would go to heaven. 'Will I go further,' asked Dr. Griffin, 'will I include the Catholics? Yes, the Catholics will go to heaven; great as the differences are between our forms of worship I am sure millions of Catholics have gone to heaven and are going.'

GROWTH OF THE Y. M. C. A.

There are now 7,631 Young Men's Christian Associations throughout the world, with 761,036 members, according to the report recently issued by the World's Committee of this 1906 are in the United States and Canada, and have 405,789 members. Germany has 1,889 Associations with 114,167 members; Great Britain and Ireland 1,403 Associations with 138,374 members; India has 110 Associations. Of the 410,000,000 worth of property held by the Associations, the United States and Canada own more than five-fourths, and employ more than five-fourths of the general secretaries. The British Soldiers' Christian Association, which is auxiliary to the Y. M. C. A., now has 400 branches, with 5,000 members, extending throughout the ranks of the British Army in all its dependencies.

SUNDAY OBSERVANCE.

A cable despatch reports the Bishop of Carlisle as favoring liberal treatment of the Lord's Day. He is reported as saying: "I am distinctly in favor of opening museums and picture galleries on Sunday, but I would have people of leisure act as cotillions and guides to visitors to these places. WILL UTILIZE WASTE ASHES.

LOOKS AS IF THE FUEL PROBLEM HAS BEEN SOLVED.

The Secret Method of the Altoona, Pa., Cobbler Has Been Discovered.

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)
Altoona, Pa., April 17.—The remarkable ashes-burning secret discovered by John Ellmore, an Altoona cobbler, which has excited attention almost the world over, is out. Almost every household in Altoona is now converting his ashes into fuel, with great saving in coal bills.

Several well-known chemists, immediately it was announced that Ellmore had solved the problem of obtaining heat from ashes, set to work to try and discover the formula. They were successful, and here it is: Moisture with either salt water or salt water in which oxalic acid has been dissolved a mixture containing one part coal and three parts ashes, and a better fuel than pure coal is obtained. The ashes of anthracite coal burn as readily as do those of bituminous coal. This mixture will, upon being placed upon a burning fire, fuse into a coke-like mass and deposit but little residue. The salt water may be obtained by the dissolution of common salt in water.

The chemical action of this compound is thus explained: When an aqueous solution of an alkaline salt, such as common salt, is mixed with coal, the result is that a mild lye is formed, which, when mixed with any combustible material, such as coal, and upon the application of heat, gives off oxygen gas, thus promoting rapid combustion. The addition of oxalic acid causes a chemical change of greater value than the first, for the reason that the second chemical breakdown results in the formation of acetylene gas, this adding to the intensity of the heat and facilitating complete combustion.

It is possible upon moistening a small quantity of ashes, without the addition of coal, to readily detect the odor of acetylene gas, and if the treated ashes are placed upon a lighted fire they will fuse and burn to a fine powder.

The ash-burning compound is now being used in many large industrial and mercantile places here, and it is claimed for it that it has reduced the fuel item more than half. It has eliminated almost entirely the question of disposing of ashes, which has been a considerable weight of coal are consumed.

The discovery has resulted in a number of complications, and regarding the work of paving, as contractors who have utilized ashes as a foundation for walks. Heretofore it was possible to secure all the ash required for this purpose without cost, but contractors are now complaining that it is impossible to get them.

Ellmore, who discovered the secret, and focused attention upon the possibilities that lurked in ashes, claims that his patent will protect his secret. He claims to have received an offer from the British Government which he can demonstrate the practicability of his compound.

While it is everywhere conceded that Ellmore has conferred a great boon upon humanity, it is feared that he will not derive any tangible benefits from his discovery, in view of the fact that hundreds of others have secured the same results, following his lead.

Lindsay's acetylene gas plant, the property of the Lindsay Gas Co., Limited, may now be said to have gone out of existence, after being inoperative for five or six years. A Lindsay citizen held a mortgage of \$700 against the property, and back taxes and other claims increased the total by a goodly amount. The property was offered Tuesday last by Sheriff McLennan at public or private sale, but there were no bidders, and Sheriff Foster set out to find a customer. The stock of iron piping in and about the premises was offered to the local plumbers, but their best offer was only \$35, whereupon MacPherson & Co., Peterborough, were communicated with. A representative of the firm came up and fairly jumped at the chance to pick up a carload of good pipe at \$110. The building and lot became the property of Mr. Douglas Sinclair at \$475, and tanks and other portions of the plant yet to be disposed of should realize a nice sum. The street lamps and piping in the mains were not included in the Sheriff's list, and should be attached by the town to cover damages for non-performance of contract or overdue taxes.
