The Boer general, Cronje, surrendered with about 3,000 men and had about 1,500 killed. Yesterday I went to the place to see if any of our wounded were there, and such a sight l never saw in all my life, and don't want to see another like it. What with the dead Boers and horses the stench was enough to poison one. Now I am on the march again.
