THE COLD STORAGE MATTER.

If there is any one thing that the Dominion government has earned the good opinion o' the farmers for it is the introduction of steamship cold storeg'. P.e. ious governments h.d. tinkered with this project for years, but never accomplished anything. But Hon. Mr. Fisher had no sooner assumed the office of Minister of Agriculture than he brought intelligence and ousiness tact to bear on the question with the result that for less than one-tenth of the sum his predecessor had decided to pay he secured double the quantity of storage. The contract he mide was for three years, and the maximum rate to be charged, 10 shillings per ton over ordinary rates, was very low. Not anticipating a war, which would make a heavy draft on the merchant marine, he did not make the contract for a longor term, the Minister righ ly conj cluing that by the ent of that period the development of cold stor go export business on natural lines would be such that no steamship would be without its cold stor g comp r.m n's. So accu ate was this preview that last summe ships not included in the contract with the government were found instelling h ir own cold stor ge p ants and finding ample sale for the space at good rates. The stipulations as to rates proved a valuable concession to the Canadian shipper, for there have been times when the American shipments have had to bear an extra charge of from 20 to 60 shill-

But the war came, and with it a large increase in rates owing to the withdrawal of so many vessels from competition. As soon as the trade conditions were made known to Mr. Fisher, he arranged for a continuation f a part of the contract for another two years, thus ensuring the presence in the Montreal trade of twenty. seven cold storage steamers as against twenty-hee last year. And instead of leaving Canadian perishable product business at the risk of being disorganized by excessive freight rates, Mr. Fisher arranged as before for a maximum extra charge. In this case, owing to the ruling high freight rates, this extra charge is placed at fficen shilling; instead of t.n. as orginally. Sir Charles Tupper now, seys Mr. Fisher ought to have known there was going to be war and ought to have made his bargain with the steamship people six months earlier at the old rate. But if anybody should have known war was coming, as Sir Charles says, the shipowners had an equal chance with the Minister, and would probably have held out for high prices anyhow. 
