Provincial and Dominion Boards Proposed-Lock-Outs and Strikes Will Be Illegal After the Passage of the Ast-The Admission of Undestrabte immigrants - Mr. Ctergue's Stasi Rait Cantrast.

Ottawa, April 30 .- Mr. Mulsch yesterday afternoon introduced his bill for the settlement of railway dis-Butes; and explained its previsions; were considered; and the contract the Ciergie Company for sup-Biving steel ratis was again the sub-ject of criticism: Mr. Barker moved an amendment to reduce the item for steal rails and fastenings for the interesionial Bailway from \$600,000 to \$200.000, not for the purpose of reducing the expenditure for that work, but in order that the amount struck off would be charged against working expenses, and incidentally increase the deficit or reduce the surplus as the case might be. amendment was defeated.

The Finance Minister has given notice of a resolution empowering him to borrow the sum of \$15,000,-000 to pay the floating indebtedness of the Dominion, and to meet current financial requirements.

The correspondence between the Government, the City of Quebec, and the loyalist associations of Ontario, in reference to the proposal to erect a monument at Quebec to the memory of the American General Montgomery, was tabled in the House yesterday as a return. It appears from the record that the loyalist associations having protested against the proposal of certain United States citizens, chiefly on the ground that Montgomery's position in 1775 was that of a rebel, the City Council of Quebec took action on March 7 last, and passed a resolution rescinding the permission previously given to the United States and Thextee have since rasigned, proposed Sons of the Revolution to

Railway Labor Disputes. Mr. Mulock introduced a bill the settlement of railway labor dis-

putes. The measure applies to all steam and electric railways, including the Intercolonial Railway. The bill makes strikes and lock-outs il legal and punishable, and provides for compulsory arbitration. conciliation boards are provincial and Dominion

Provincial boards will deal with the railways situated in each province, and the Dominion board will deal with those railways operating in more than one province. It provides for seven provincial boards, each consisting of three members. One member is to be chosen by the railway company, one by the ployes and the third by the other two members. If they do not agree, by the Governor-in-Council.

The Dominion board is to be composed of five members, two elected by the seven representatives of the rail way owners on the provincial boards; ill two by the seven employes, representatives on the provincial boards, and the fifth by the other four or by the Governor-in-Council. Each board to have a permanent secretary.

The measure provides the machinery for the election of members the provincial boards. The railway owners in the province vote at Ottawa, each company having as many votes as the number of its employes. There will be at Ottawa an officer to be called the registrar, whose it will be from time to time to prepare the election registers. For the second class of arbitrators, each employe has one vote. The elections are to be held every three years, that being the length of time which each member of the board may sit.
