(To the Editor of The Post.) Sir,-I accept full responsibility for the item in this matter. It was given to you as a matter of news, and every word of it is true. It does not in any way convey the impression trat the men struck for higher wages as stated by the Committee, but gives the exact reason of the strike and expresses no opinion thereon, either way,

The men have been sent to Fencelon Falls as stated, and I think you wall find steam up there already. There is more danger of losing the Rathbun mill than people have any idea of. They can carry on business here without their mill ; they can cut all their logs which will not float at Fenelon Falis, and can take the rest to their mills lower down; and this is what they intend doing. Some time ago, when the question of removal was being discussed, I threew all the cold water possible on it-so much so that the Company thought I was too much in favor of the town and empleyed another soilciter to conduct the negotiations. Knowing this, I thought it my duty to call attention to the matter at once, hence the information given you, and can only; express my surprise that you are so


