Jas. McCreary, hostler at the Royal hotel, Lindsay, for the past two years, issued his last stable check on Friday. Sunday 'at noon his stiffened body was found in the shallow yacht slip at McConnell's Island, Sturgeon Lake, known locally as "Paradise."

Falconbridge C. J., Street, J., and Britton. J .- the plaintiff is a carpenter living at Kirkfield, and the defendants are Canal contractors at Kirkfield. On the 23rd August, 1902, the plaintiff, whilst in the employment of the defendants, was directed by one Thomas Low, Superintendent for the defendants, to cover the top of a newly-made cement wall with planks taken from the bed of the Canal. The bed of the Canal where the planks were secured was dargerous in that same was strewn with boards and planks with nails projecting, and whilst in the act of carrying the plank the plaint if stepped on a wire nail, which entered his foct, inflicting serious injury. The defendants alleged that the injury was the result of the plaintiff's own

The action was tried at Lindsay during the fall assizes of 1903 before Mr. Justice McMahon, without a jury, and judgment was given for the defendants, dismissing the plaintiff's action with costs. The plaintiff appealed from this judgment, and the appeal was argued before the above Court at Toronto in February last Judgment was handed out Friday allowing the appeal and declaring the plaintiff entitled to \$750 and costs of both Courts. 
