"Yes I got my share of the fur trappers Saturday, when questioned by a Post representative concerping his luck in the spring campaign against the muskcats, which closed May 1st. "Trapping didn't open till about the 10th of April, and there was a small army of young fellows on the river, the result being that some of them were always getting in the way. I fancy, too, that a few of us old trappers lost in occasional pelt, from our traps, the

greenhorns being anxious to show that they were doing a good share of business. There isn't much money in trapping nowadays. Twenty-five .ive years ago O'Brien had the upper river and Wast and East Creeks all to himself, and I remember one season when three of us set out all the traps to be found on the lower channel and McLaren's. My share of the catch netted me \$150 that spring."
