BLOWN UP BY A MINE

Japanese Cruiser Miyako Destroyed in Kerr Bay.

RUSSIA'S RESISTANCE TO JAPS

Japanese Squadron Could Not Drive Russians From Their Position on Sunday—Fights With Chinese Brigands—They Cause Russians a Deal of Trouble—Japs Vigorously Besieging Port Arthur.

London, May 17.—The Shanghai correspondent of The Morning Post, cabling under date of May 16, says that according to native reports from Port Arthur the Japanese are vigorously besieging the fortress night and day by land and sea, and that sixty Japanese warships and transports have been sighted in Blackney Bay, and that heavy firing has been heard in Kichau Bay.

BLOWN UP BY A RUSSIAN MINE.

Jap Cruiser Destroyed With Two Killed and 22 Wounded.

Tokio, May 17.—The Japanese despatch boat Miyako was destroyed in Kerr Bay by striking a submerged mine. Eight casualties are reported. The Miyako was last while assisting in the operations of clearing the Russian mines from Kerr Bay, north-east of Tallienwan Bay, on which Port Dalny is situated. Admiral Kataoka (commander of the third squadron), returned there Sunday with a detachment of his squadron, protecting two flotillas of torpedo boats, which had been detailed to complete sweeping the harbor by the removal of mines. Five mines were discovered and exploded, and the work was being suspended for the day when the Miyako struck an undiscovered mine, which exploded with tremendous force under her stern, on the port side, and inflicted immense damage on the hull. The Miyako sank in 22 minutes. Two sailors were killed, and 22 men were wounded. The rest of the crew were rescued.

Stubborn Resistance Offered.

Admiral Kataoka reports that the Russians withdrew from Robinson Point (north-east of Kerr Bay, which adjoins Tallienwan Bay), May 12, but they erected a temporary fort on a height north-east of Taku Mountain, where they mounted six guns and constructed protecting trenches. The vessels of Admiral Kataoka's squadron shelled the Russians throughout Sunday, but the latter stubbornly retained their position. The Japanese flotillas, while sweeping the bay, were exposed to the Russian fire all day, but continued their work uninjured.

The Miyako, a cruiser of 1,800 tons displacement, and was 314 feet long. Her armament consisted of two 4.7-inch quick-firing guns and ten 3-pounders.

50 Miles of Railway Blown Up.

St. Petersburg, May 17.—The Japanese evidently are determined that there shall not be any further rail communication between General Kurapatkin and Port Arthur. Official advice received yesterday by the general staff says the Japanese have destroyed fifty miles of the railroad north of Kinchou.

No resistance was made by the Russians, who are gradually abandoning it on the Japanese approach. Col. Spiridof is seeking to render the railroad useless as possible by the enemy by removing the switches and otherwise disabling it. The Russians are retiring because of the approach of the Japanese columns sent westward by General Kuroki immediately after the occupation of Fengwangcheng.

Experts who discussed the military situation yesterday expressed the opinion that General Kurapatkin will not remain at Liaoyang.

Japs Undecided Say Russians.

St. Petersburg, May 17.—The following despatch from Major-General Pflug, dated May 15, has been received at the War Ministry: According to information received up to May 13 the enemy's advance from Fengwangcheng towards Liaoyang is characterized by indecision. It is supposed that the objective of principal Japanese forces is a point beyond Haicheng or Haityou (Kaichau), another important group of the forces is concentrating in the district north-west of Takushan. Several skirmishes have occurred with Chinese bandits, in which three Cossacks were killed and four are reported missing.

The general staff has received the following despatch from Lieut.-General Sakharof (Gen. Kurapatkin's chief of staff), dated May 15: "On May 14 I was informed that Chinese bandits had appeared in villages 16 kilometres west of Liaoyang, and I sent out detachments of riflemen, mounted and on foot and a company of infantry. No bandits were found in the villages, the inhabitants of which answered evasively. As the forces were returning from the village of Shantaidza, 12 kilometres west of Liaoyang considerable numbers of bandits were discovered at a spot where they had been concealed by the villagers. The riflemen attacked the bandits, who occupied the outskirts of the village, from which they were dislodged. They left 20 dead and a number of rifles and many cartridges. Our loss was two soldiers killed and three wounded. The Japanese have reoccupied Kaouindian Sian."

Russia Is Without News.

St. Petersburg, May 17.—Owing to the interruption of communication with Port Arthur, the Admiralty has no information of its own, either regarding the blowing up of the Japanese cruiser Miyako on May 15 or the torpedoing and crippling of an armored Japanese cruiser in Tallienwan Bay, May 10, by a torpedo launch in command of a young Russian naval officer.

Loss of \$10,000.

FAVOR ICE BREAKERS.

Government Will Hereafter Keep St. Lawrence River Channel Clear.

Montreal, May 17.—Commodore Spain of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, at a meeting held yesterday of the shipping interests and members of the Harbor Board, announced that the Government had decided to place two ice-breaking steamers on the St. Lawrence route between Quebec and Montreal. There will be one big steamer, which will keep the channel at Cape Rouge, the most dangerous spot in the channel, clear of ice during the entire winter, and a small steamer, which will be used between Sorel and Montreal.

Toronto Rhodes Scholarship.

Toronto, May 17.—Ernest Riddell Paterson, B.A., son of John A. Paterson, K.C., 51 Walmer road, was awarded the Rhodes Scholarship at the special meeting of Toronto University Senate last night. Mr. Paterson was born Sept. 1, 1881, and was educated at Harbord Collegiate Institute, taking a scholarship there at the age of 16. At the University he took honors in classics, which is his favorite course of study, and which he intends to pursue at Oxford, whither he goes in the fall. He graduated in 1902, in which year he was editor of Varsity.

Judgment Reserved.

Toronto, May 17.—In the Court of Appeal Chief Justice Moss presiding the application on behalf of E. A. Dunlop, M.P.P., for North Renfrew, was heard yesterday. Mr. Dunlop wishes to have the Rev. J. A. Macdonald, managing editor of The Globe, committed for contempt of court, on account of an editorial published on May 6 entitled "A Celebrated Election Case." I. F. Hellmuth, K.C., appeared for the applicant, and A. B. Aylesworth for the defendant. Judgment upon the application was reserved. The argument lasted over three hours.
