EXPANSION OF Y.M.C.A. WORK

FEATURES OF THE GREAT INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION AT BUFFALO.

Delegates from all Parts of the World—Some Notes by a Representative of Lindsay Railroad and Town Y. M. C. A.

The 35th International Convention of Young Men's Christian Associations passed into history at Buffalo Sunday evening, the 15th. The general topic was "Foreign Work," and secretaries of the International Committee from China, Japan, India, Brazil and Mexico, addressed the meeting, which was held in Convention Hall with a seating capacity of about 7,000. It is said that an offer of \$40,000 for the foreign work was tendered by Miss Helen M. Gould. She was in attendance at the Thursday and Friday evening sessions and the leading ladies of Buffalo gave her a grand reception in the Association building Saturday, from 4 to 6 p.m.

50 years ago, June 7-8, 1854, the first convention of the Y.M.C.A. of North America was held in the city of Buffalo. Ninety-one associations were represented by 37 delegates; over 1400 delegates were present at this convention last week. At the present time there are 1900 associations; members in 1903, 350,435; 482 buildings valued at \$26,250,500; net property in 1903, \$28,230,400.

The convention opened Wednesday, the 11th, 10.30 a.m., in the Central Presbyterian church, and the headquarters were in the new building, costing \$440,000. This building is 10 stories in the centre, with a 4-story annex on either side. The social function of the convention was the Commemorative seven course banquet, held Wednesday evening, at 6.30 o'clock, in Convention Hall, about 1,400 men being present. The Association gave prepared the good things for the banquet, and ladies from 27 different churches did the serving.

The Convention Educational Exhibit was a great feature illustrating the past 50 years. The leading departments of the work were given, with an illustration of the various phases of the work. This was fine and a new feature in convention programmes.

The music of the convention was in charge of C. B. Willis of Milwaukee. The Association Quartette and Ekhart Railroad Shop Chorus assisted in the singing. The new Association hymnal, prepared by a committee under the direction of the International Committee, was used for the first time.

The following noted speakers addressed the Convention: Rev. G. Campbell Morgan (after his address Thursday evening he left for London, Eng.); John J. McCook, New York City; J. Ramsey, Jr., President Washburn Railway, Robert W. Spies, John R. Motz, W. W. Ross, L. D. Premier of Ontario, Rear Admiral F. J. Higginson, U. S. Navy, and many others.

The greatest men's meeting ever held in Buffalo was conducted by Fred B. Smith, of New York, about 5,000 men being present. A large number expressed a desire to lead the Christian life at the close of the week. Four large meetings were held for boys in different parts of the city also a meeting for women. John F. Moore, Railroad Secretary, who was in Lindsay Jan. 24th, gave the best address on the Railroad work at the Commemorative banquet.

SUGGESTION TO CHEESE DEALERS.

Scrupulous Regard for Honesty in Manufacture and Shipping Necessary.

In his report regarding the cheese trade of 1903, Mr. A. V. Gendley, agent of the Department of Agriculture in Great Britain, makes some suggestions that merit the attention of makers and exporters. He says: The cheese season of 1903 was a most successful one; there was a large increase in the quality and the steady improvement in the quality was so great that in spite of very heavy supplies the price realized on the whole were satisfactory. The mild, sweet, palatable flavor, as distinguished from the heated and biting character so noticeable in former years, has created a large and increasing demand, which will have a tendency to do away with the disproportion in value between Canadian and English Cheddar.

The practice of shipping too new or "green" cheese is not only a disreputable sale but hurts the reputation of Canadian cheese. The salesman, as well as the exporter, is to blame for sending these immature cheese, and the patrons of factories should insist that their cheese be ripened in the curing room until it is such a condition as will give satisfaction to the British consumer.

Cool Curing of Cheese. The difference in the quality of cheese held in the Government curing room is very noticeable, not only in quantity of cheese, but in general appearance.

The percentage of broken boxes was not so high during 1903, although it still runs very high, ranging from 5 to 12 per cent. The falling off in breakage is due to:

- 1. Damp season, which makes the boxes less brittle. 2. More care on the part of shipping companies in loading, stowing and discharging cargoes, this work being closely watched by the inspectors of the department. 3. The use of boxes of better quality. The latter of these was very noticeable in cheese coming from the Government curing stations, the boxes being made of heavier material; the percentage of broken boxes did not run above 5 per cent, which proves that it is false economy to buy cheap boxes.

Care should be taken not to use green, unseasoned boxes at the bottom, particularly the top and bottom, may be damaged in quality from this cause alone.

Skin Beard on Cheese. Leading British importers of Canadian cheese are in favor of branding names on the cheese, the reason in which they are made. Some years ago September cheese became the favorite, but owing to the improvement in the quality of cheese during July and August, brought about by the system of "cold curing" introduced by the Department of Agriculture, the makers of other months have tried to be near it in quality as September's.

The Children's Protection Act. Section 5 of the above act, amended in 1903, provides for the appointment in each electoral district within the Province of a committee of six persons or more, not less than half of whom shall be women, who shall be known as the "Children's Committee, and each member may be known as a children's agent. The said committee, or members thereof, shall cooperate with the Superintendent of Neglected and Dependent Children (Mr. J. J. Kelso, Toronto), and with the local Children's Aid Society, and assist in every possible way in the work of improving the condition of neglected and dependent children. In compliance with the act, in March last Judge Dean, Warden Channon and Sheriff McLennan corresponded with various parties in different parts of the Ridings, and forwarded to the following the following names of persons who have consented to act, viz.: West Riding—Mrs. E. LeFere, Little Britain; Mrs. C. E. Weeks, Mrs. J. J. Kelso, Toronto; Mr. John Walsh, Kirkfield; and Mr. Newton Small, Lindsay. East Riding—John Bailey, Head Lake; Miss T. Scully, Realton; Mr. Eugene Shine, Downsville; Mr. Kelso has forwarded the above names to Mrs. E. S. Sharpe, secretary Lindsay Children's Aid Society, asking her to have them added to the officers of the local Society as corresponding agents, and utilize their services whenever possible.
