Scrupulous Regard for Honesty in Manufacture and Shipping Necessary.

In his report regarding the cheese trade of 1903, Mr. A. W. Grindley, agent of the Department of Agriculture in Great Britain, makes some suggestions that merit the attention -Some Notes by a Representative of makers and experters. He says: The cheese season of 1903 was a most successful one; there was a large increase in the quality and the steady improvement in the quality was so great that in spice of very heavy supplies the price realized on best Goods made, at Bargain Prices. the whole were satisfactory. The mild, sweet, palatable flavor,, as distinguished from the heated and biting character so noticeable in former years, has created a large consumptive demand, which will have a tendency to do away with Canadian and English Cheddar. The practise of shipping too new or

'green' cannot be too emphatically condemned as it not only applies the sale but hurts the reputation of Canadian cheese. The calesman, as well as the exporter, is to blame for sending these immature cheese, and the patrons of fectories should insist that their cheese should be held in the curing room until it is is such a condition as will give catisfaction to the Eritish consumer. Cool Curing of Chaose.

The difference in the quality of chease held in the Government cool curing rooms as very noticeable, not only in quamy of chease, but in general appearance. This improvement is one to cool curing and "waxing" the choese, which also has the advantage of preventing a considerable percentage of shrinkage. During the scaron of 1902, when "waxing" cheese first appeared on the British market, some of the grocers' associations objected, and even went so far as to demand an allowanen in weights, but it was soon proved that there was less shrinkage which, adds ed to the improved quality and ap-
