OBITUARY.

The Late Philip Kennedy, of Hastings. It is our sad duty to record the demise of one of Hastings' most esteemed and honorable citizens in the person of Mr. Philip Kennedy, who died at St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, on Friday, May 13th, after an illness of nearly four years. Although Mr. Kennedy had been slowly sinking for a time, and his death was not wholly unexpected, a wave of sorrow swept over the village when it was learned that he had passed away. Born in the parish of Berriagh, Co. Tipperary, Ireland, he spent the first seventeen years of his life in that vicinity. In the summer of 1854 he came to Canada and immediately engaged with the firm of Clune & Kennedy, of Warkworth, with whom he remained for five years. He then went into business for himself at Sydneyham, township of Loughboro, Co. Exeter, but in 1863 came to Hastings, and here remained continuously in business until May 1900. In June of the same year he visited his active land returning in November. During the trip he took seriously ill and on his return he went to St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, for treatment. His illness was of such

LINDSAY'S NEW LIBRARY

Very Good, But Not What It Should be for the Cost.

Peterboro Review, Wednesday: In conversation with Mr. D. W. Dunlop this morning, he gave us his opinion of the new Carnegie library in Lindsay. He said: "The Carnegie library is about complete and it is a very compact, snug little building. The library committee wanted the Council to provide a suitable lot on which to build the library, but from false motives or economy they failed to do so, and it was built on this market square, which is not at ideal location. It will suffer from the smoke of the locomotives and the noise from the passing school children. The building cost \$13,000 and \$200 is still needed to finish it, and for this \$500 the good friends in Lindsay had the courage to ask Mr. Carnegie. Some were a little ashamed of this. The building is the opinion of many a far short of modern ideas. Upstairs there are two rooms for reading rooms, and a semi-circular room for the books. Downstairs there are a couple of smoking rooms, with a paper toilet, rooms for ladies and gentlemen. The work is well done, the finish being in ash, which is stained and varnished. But one cannot help wondering why so much money has been sunk so far below the soil in the heavy clay land, where in summer time there must be a heavy, damp air, making it unhealthy for people to sit there long. The whole building, while it provides ample accommodation for the present, does not adequately provide for the future. If we ever build a library in Peterboro we should see that we try and go one better. \$13,000 should provide a library more above ground, and much more suitable for the requirements."

THE STOREHOUSE COLLAPSED.

Flavello Milling Co. Suffer a Loss at Reboro.

On Thursday, May 19th last the roof of Brown's grain warehouse at Reboro collapsed and fell inward, and the jar sprung part of the side sheeting. The building contained about 15,000 bushels of wheat, oats and barley, the property of Flavello Milling Co., and when the roof collapsed the grain orders that the mills here be closed down Friday and that the day staff be sent down on the morning train to bag the loose grain and load it in the cars. This was accomplished, but some loss will be occasioned owing to the partial wetting of a quantity. The operations were conducted under the superintendence of Mr. Miller.

THE COURT OF REVISION

Deal With a Number of Local Improvement Works Thursday 19th.

Mayor Sutherland and Aldermen McWatters, O'Reilly, McGrae and Cinnamon, composing the Court of Revision, met yesterday at 10 o'clock in the Council chamber. The following Local Improvements works were considered and dealt with: 1. The granolithic walk on the south side of Glenelg-st., from William to Lindsay-sts. 2. The sanitary sewer and cellar drain on Durham-st. and Sussex-st., from Albert to Glenelg-st. 3. The sanitary sewer and cellar drain on Fair-ave., from Albert to Adelaide-sts. 4. The sanitary sewer and cellar drain on Cambridge-st. from a point 65 feet south of Francis-st. to Bond-st. 5. The sanitary sewer and cellar drain on Melbourne-st. from a point 30 ft. east of Cambridge-st. to William-st. Moved by Ald. O'Reilly, seconded by Ald. McWatters, that the assessment, frontage and measurements of the works be confirmed, there being no appeals against same. Carried. The Court then adjourned.

MORE JAPS LANDED

At Takushan and On the Liaotung Peninsula.

SEVERAL BRISK ENCOUNTERS

Heavy Loss of Russians—300 in One Skirmish Near Kinchow—Reported Retreat of Japanese Main Army Not Confirmed—Advance Guard Falls Back Twelve Miles Before the Cossacks.

London, May 21.—The Japanese legion yesterday received the following official despatch from Tokio: "A portion of one army commenced landing at Takushan, west of the mouth of the Yalu River, yesterday."

Russians Repulsed With Loss. Tokio, May 21.—The following official statement was issued here yesterday: "A section of infantry of the Liaotung forces went in the direction of Shanchuan to reconnoitre and met two sections of Russian infantry. The Russians were repulsed in thirty minutes. Our casualties were one officer and four men killed and one officer and eight men wounded. The Russian casualties were one officer killed and forty to fifty men killed. The landing of Japanese troops at Takushan began yesterday."

Landing Accomplished Speedily. "Admiral Hosoya, commanding the third squadron, reports that with the third squadron, consisting of the Fuso, Hei Yen, Takushiki, Sai Yen and other vessels, he protected the landing of troops at an unnamed place, probably Takushan, yesterday, bombarded the coast and landed a party of bluejackets, who occupied a point of land and raised the Japanese flag at 8 o'clock in the morning. The landing of troops immediately commenced, and was accomplished very quickly."

Russians Lost 300. London, May 21.—The Japanese Legion here gave out yesterday the following despatch, received from Tokio: "The enemy's forces participating in the fight near Kinchow (Liaotung Peninsula), May 16, consisted of the Fifth, Fourteenth and Sixteenth Sharpshooters (infantry), with eight quick-firing guns. They left on the 17th to embark on the coast. According to the prisoners, the enemy's casualties were over three hundred."

Japs Retreated 12 Miles. St. Petersburg, May 21.—An official report has been received to the effect that Gen. Rennenkampf's Cossacks fell on the Japanese column advancing on Fengwangcheng on Wednesday, and that the Japanese were compelled to retreat for a distance of twelve miles.

The Russians have evacuated Kalpin (or Kaichou) about thirty-five miles south of Newchwang without a fight.

Japs Head For Mukden. Liaoyang, May 21.—Forty-five battalions of Japanese troops have been landed on the Liaotung Peninsula. In order to embarrass their advance the Russians have destroyed the railroad bridge.

The Japanese have retired to Fengwangcheng, though divisions are moving northward, their apparent destination being Mukden. The excitement among the Chinese has been increasing during the last few days. The Chinese bandits are causing considerable trouble and are being energetically hunted by Cossacks.

The Eastern Chinese Railroad has increased its carrying capacity, and for some days past troops have been arriving quickly and in splendid condition.

Drowned From Yoshino and Hatsuse. Tokio, May 21.—The loss of life incurred by the sinking of the cruiser Yoshino included Captain Sayeki, Commander Hirowateri, three first lieutenants, five second lieutenants, five midshipmen, a paymaster, surgeon, three engineers' cadets and eight boatswain mates. Of the crew the number of those lost is unknown.

Those who went down with the battleship Hatsuse when she foundered were Commander Tsukamoto, Commander Viscount Nire, Commander Arimori, five second lieutenants, five sub-engineers, two surgeons, six midshipmen, four cadet engineers and ten non-commissioned officers.

It is not known yet in this case how many of the men perished. The Hatsuse was surely sunk by coming in contact with a submerged mine and not by the attack of a submarine boat.

The report that the battleship Shikishima was damaged and the battleship Fuji sunk is denied here.

Port Arthur Free. St. Petersburg, May 21.—Naval officers say that the channel to Port Arthur is free, despite the Japanese claims to the contrary, and that the Russian fleet may go out again within a fortnight. Second thoughts have caused the admiralty officials to discredit the report that the Japanese battleship Shikishima and Fuji have been destroyed.

Ship Was Destroyed. Tokio, May 21.—A trustworthy report has been received at Imperial Headquarters that the Russian cruiser Bogatyr ran ashore outside Vladivostok in a heavy fog and was destroyed. This is the first ship of the Vladivostok squadron to be destroyed.

The report of the grounding of the cruiser Bogatyr came Thursday night from the St. Petersburg correspondent of The Echo de Paris, and was announced by the Russian admiralty yesterday.

A cable from Vladivostok yesterday was almost to the Russian ty and reported all quiet there.

What Japan May Do. Chicago, May 21.—A special to The Daily News says: "Port Arthur is to be taken by storm the moment proper preparations have been completed. Siege guns have yet to be placed in position, and the land forces appointed for the assault have to be strengthened. The unexpected loss of two
