Macon, Ga., May 23.-Believing that he was worth more to his creditors dead than living, Ribert H. Plant, president of the First National Bank, and owner of the Plant's Sons' Bank, both recently placed in the hands of receivers, arose from a sick bed and committed suicide by shooting himself through the temple. By his act \$800,000, carried as life insurance, may be distributed between his wife and his creditors.
