ASQUITH'S LUCID STATEMENT

Repeals Export Coal Duty, and Tax on Red Stripped Tobacco—Chancellor Refers to the Growth of the National Debt, and Deplores Excessive Sums to Army-Navy.

London, May 1.—In the House of Commons yesterday the benches were full when the Chancellor of the Exchequer rose to introduce the first budget of the new Liberal administration. Mr. Asquith began by reviewing the past financial year, pointing out the cheering fact that the revenue was larger than the expenditure and the country was in the happy position of having realized a surplus of \$17,233,900.

TOWN FATHERS IN SESSION

ROSS MEMORIAL HOSPITAL VOTED THE SUM OF \$300.

Civic Improvement Committee Will be Aided by Board of Works.

Mr. J. D. Flavell, chairman of the Board of Management of the Ross Memorial Hospital, waited on the Town Council last Monday and presented the following statement, showing the relation of the Town of Lindsay to the maintenance of the hospital, for the year ending December 31, 1905, and asking for a grant of \$300, which was voted:

Mr. Asquith estimated the expenditure for 1906-7 at \$708,329,496, and the revenue at \$724,300,000. There would be, therefore, an estimated surplus of \$15,970,500. Deducting \$2,000,000 for contingencies they would have a disposable balance of nearly \$13,970,500.

The steadily growing prosperity of the country in 1906 had continued during the first quarter of 1906.

Continuing Mr. Asquith called attention to the progressive deterioration of the yield of the duties on alcoholic liquors. The change, he added, had apparently affected all classes of spirits, and would be hailed with pleasure by social reformers. But he doubted whether it was safe to base thereon any wide generalization as to a vast change in social habits.
