Conmee Act Not Applicable. The Conmee Act would not apply to any municipality receiving power under the act, except if the municipality or the company asked that a valuation be made the commission could do so.

The commission might designate any plants to be used for the purposes of the act. Wherever it was impossible to come to any agreement with the existing companies the commission might expropriate any lands, water privileges or plants. The bill permitted the commission to take power from the companies under an agreement.

Accountants and engineers would be appointed to apportion the amounts to be paid by the municipalities. No matter what quantity of power would be used the price at point of development would be the same, and the cost of transmission added. Municipalities at a great distance would pay a higher price by reason of the cost of transmission. The cost of transmission would also depend on the amount transmitted.

Rate Regulating Clause. Clause 17 authorized the Government to raise funds to carry out the project. There was also a rate regulating plied to companies already in existence, whose rates were exorbitant. The municipality could complain to the commission, which would regulate the rates. A penalty of \$100 was provided in the case of any company refusing to fur-

nish information. The commission was also given power, Mr. Beck said, to report on any water power available in the pro-

Mr. Ross Wants Time.

Mr. Ross said it was evidently a comprehensive bill, which gave the Government power to raise money on the strength of a commission. The Premier said the bill meant that the Government should, as far as possible, take it to themselves to see that consumers received power at reasonable rates. The only question was as to the method of doing this. The commission was authorized to make arrangements with producers, and if the producers refused to furnish power at reasonable rates then the bill gave power to expropriate or deliver power to fulfill the pledge made by the Government to the people.
