The Whitby line has taken the lead for fast time. The special train last week, bringing out the Victoria Railway directors made the forty-six miles from Whitby to Lindsay in one hour and a quarter, or thirty-miles an hour.

Dr. Lloyd of Bobsayson, a dissipated character, has been sentenced by the Magistrate to confinement in the Lindsay gaol for selling liquor to the Indians.

Sept. 9.—Fires were much prevalent about this time and farmers were always dreading them, fearing to leave the property without being guarded.

The Lindsay and Fenelon Falls companies of the 46th batt., left on Tuesday for Picton.

Mr. John Quin, a young man in the employ of Mr. Wm. Arksey, Optometrist, was injured by falling down stairs. His spine was injured and his body was completely paralyzed from the time of the accident.

Sept. 16.—A robbery at the Midland station at Lindsay, is reported in this issue. Some \$200 in cash was taken.

Sept. 23.—The Post this week reports in detail of President Garfield's death and happenings in his dying hours.

Victoria Road was visited by a destructive fire and a big loss experienced by the merchants and residents.

On Thursday of last week as Mr. Fremont Crandell and Mr. Beattie, of New York were out duck hunting on Sturgeon lake, not far from the hotel, they observed a large bear on the surface of the lake, and as they were armed with shot guns only they opened fire, with serious effect to Mr. Bruin.
