Toronto Entirely Destroyed.

LOSS AMOUNTED TO \$145,000

Knox Manufacturing Co. Burnt Out-Cause of Fire Supposed to Have Been Lighted Cigar - Adjoining Premises Suffered From Deluge of Water-Firemen Did Good

Toronto, May 6.—Loss in the sum of \$145,000 will be entailed by fire which broke out at 5.30 o'clock Saturday evening in the second storey of the Knox Manufacturing Co. premises,

These premises were deluged, there being nearly a foot of water on every floor and more in the basement. A veritable Niagara Falls poured out of the Knox building door, flooding the

Mr. Knox placed his loss at \$90,000 on stock, which was totally destroyed. On this there is \$61,000 insurance. The building was completely gutted, but the walls were intact. The damage to this is placed at \$25,000. It is owned by the Countess of Carnarvon, whose Canadian agent is C. Czowski. This is said to be fully covered.

Gunpowder Explodes At Canton, China, With Fearful Results.

MASSIVE CITY WALL RAZED

Fifteen Hundred Houses Wrecked-Heavy Loss of Life-Hundreds of People Injured - Supposed That Disaster Occurred Through Man Smoking - Historical Pagoda Escapes-21 Bodies Found.

Hong Kong, May 4.-Great destruction of life and property was caused at Canton Thursday evening by the explosion of a gunpowder magazine.
Twenty-one bodies have already been recovered from the ruins. Hundreds of persons were injured. Fifteen build-ings were razed, and over a hundred others were wrecked.

A section, two hundred feet long, of the massive city wall, was thrown down. The historical many-storied pa-goda escaped with slight injuries. The officials and staffs of the hospitals are doing their best to succor the suffer-ers. In the Shamien suburb, where foreigners live, a terrific shock, caused by the explosion, was felt, but the residents were unharmed. Some idea of the force of the explo-

sion may be gathered from the fact that the roofs of houses a mile distant were blown off. A number of important Chinese and foreign mercantile establishments

were demolished. The bodies recovered from ruins near the magazine were shockingly mutilated. Many corpses of men and women were without heads. The officer in charge of the magazine was among those killed, and when

the body was recovered a pipe was found clutched in his hands, which suggests the possible cause of the explosion. The financial losses are enormous.

MINING ACCIDENT.

Three Men Killed and Six Injured This Time.

Johnstown, Pa., May 4.—Three men were killed and six others injured, three fatally, Thursday, in an accident in an ore mine at Riddlesburg, Bedford County. The men were all foreigners. THROWS RED-HOT STONES. Volcano on Stromboli Islands Still

Very Active. Naples, May 4.-The volcano on Stromboli Island is still very active, and is throwing up large quantities of red-hot stones. Prolonged subterranean rumblings are frequently heard. The lava is now taking its former course to the sea down the north side of the mountain. Showers of scoriae began again Thursday, but the inhabitants show no alarm.

Milan, May 4.-Arcangelo Rossi, the tenor, who was with the Conried Opera Co. in San Francisco during the earthquake, and who, as the result of the fright he experienced, has not since been well, endeavored to commit suicide here Thursday. Empress of Britain Delayed St. John, N. B., May 4.-The Empress of Britain was 12 hours late leaving St. John. Instead of getting away between three and four yesterday afternoon, she did not sail until that time this morning. The delay was due to a freight wreck on the C. P. R., near Megantic, which blocked the line and prevented the arrival the Montreal train, bringing upwards of 200 passengers for the steam-

Shot by His Neighbor. New York, May 4 .- A despatch from Liberty, N. Y., says that Philip Sullivan, aged 44, manager of the Liberty House bowling alleys and billiard parlor, was shot and killed Thursday night by Michael Noeth. - Sullivan was romping with his children on the lawn at his home when Noeth, who is a neighbor, shot him without warning. Noeth is under arrest. No cause is known for the tragedy.

Freight Handlers Go Back. Quebec, May 4.-The strike of freight handlers at the Levis Station has been settled, the trainmaster of the G. T. R. at Island Pond visiting Levis Thursday and making arrangements whereby the men returned to work, and freight is being accepted and shipped as usual.

Colonial Visitors See "Dreadnought" -Finish of Preference Debate-Australia Resentful - Proposed Defence Fund From Duties on Foreign Goods-Mr. Balfour Favors Preference-Would Accept.

Thursday's conference session was issued yesterday. Sir William Lyne of Australia regretted Mr. Asquith's statement, because he did not regard it as quite fair to treat the short tar-iff offered by Australia, and which was a beginning only, as the result of the preference movement there. The people of Australia resented the idea that thy, the kith of the Motherland, should be treated on the same footing as foreigners. There was a margin on the imports of foodstuffs on which the colonies could be assisted, with the result that an additional revenue would be obtained at the expense of the foreigner and not the consumer. He contended that free trade must not be accepted as an inherited dogma. He asked also why there should not be special consideration for Australian wines.

PREMIERS SEE DREADNOUGHT.

World's Greatest Battleship Duly Impresses Colonial Visitors. Portsmouth, England, May 4.-The Colonial Premiers were all brought here yesterday as guests of the Admiralty, to get a glimpse of the Empire's navy. Ten battleships, including the Dreadnought, a score of cruisers and 37 torpedo boat destroyers, all belonging to the home fleet, assembled in these waters, were reviewed by the visiting statesmen, who were especially interested in the newest battleship. In describing the Dreadnought, the official program of the day's proceedings says:

"She has satisfied her creators and fulfilled all anticipations. per cent. of her guns were first fired together, with a total energy of 345,-792 foot tons, some cups and saucers were broken.
