## GRUESOME FIND IN THE SOUTH WARD

### Dead Body of Infant Discovered by Three Boys in a Garden.

Encased in a Pillow Slip and Newspapers—Evidence at Coroner's Inquest Points to Infanticide—Investigation Adjudged.

Evening Post of May 17.

The finding of the body of an infant, encased in a pillow slip and wrapped up in newspapers, last evening, created a good deal of excitement in town. The body exhibited signs of foul treatment, being cut and bruised. It was found by three boys—George Workman, son of Mr. Wm. Workman, Harry Watson, and Earl Thurston, who were hunting for a lost ball.

George Workman was the first to be examined. The boy is only nine years old, and is a bright little fellow. When sworn, he said he saw the body first when looking for a lost ball. They had been playing in Mrs. Mahar's garden, and the ball had been thrown towards the hedge. He saw the parcel, and curiously prompted the parcel, and thinking it was a dead cat, he called his companions. An old copy of The Weekly Post and also a copy of the Watchman-Wardener of September 20th, 1906, were wrapped around the body itself being covered with a pillow slip. Chief Vincent was notified and took it away. It appeared to have been carefully hidden close to the fence.

Harry Watson, seven, corroborated the Workman's story. He told about informing Mrs. Mahar, who called the neighbors, saying, "The boys have found a little dead baby."

Earl Thurston reiterated the above particulars. His inquest was then adjourned until Wednesday, May 29, in the meantime efforts will be made to locate the guilty parties.

Speaking to a Post reporter, the judge said the body was a gruesome-looking object when discovered. "It was all bundled up in a pillow slip," said young Workman. "Its hands were bruised, and the body cut, and altogether presented a dreadful appearance." Evidently the child had been allowed to die from neglect, no medical aid having been taken to prolong its life after birth.

**THE INQUEST.**

Coroner Burrows ordered an inquest into the cause of the infant's death and the following were impanelled as a jury this morning: Jas. **SCHOOL BOARD MATTERS.**

(To the Editor of The Post.)

Dear Sir,—In your issue of last Monday the following statement appears:

"The other evening we happened into a bunch of pater-familias talking school. Some of the things said were not very complimentary to some of the teachers, and the question was asked several times during the confab: 'Why does the School Board permit these things?'—more especially the Chairman of the Board, and the Chairman of the Management Committee, to both of whose attention the matters in question have been brought several times."

This purports to be from a correspondent who does not sign his name. We cannot deal with a man who conceals his identity and remains in ambush. We therefore decline to answer him. We can only trust the publication, as you only are responsible for that which appears in your paper.

We ask you to furnish us with the names of the "bunch" mentioned above. If you are satisfied of their identity, we will ask the men for particulars of their complaints, and these will receive our best consideration and shall be submitted to the Board. You may give the names either through the editor of your paper or by personal letter to us, as you prefer. You have published the above statement and we ask for the names, and justice to yourself and to us and the schools.

Every complaint which has come to either of us has been dealt with on its merits, and has been disposed of satisfactorily to the parties concerned or has been brought to the attention of the Advisory Committee or the whole Board, except in a few instances where the person complaining has refused to allow his name to be used, or the complaint to be formulated. It is scarcely worth one's while finding fault and at the same time censoring the complaint with such restrictions.

In the same article you charge some teacher or teachers with partiality and improper treatment of pupils. You do not say which teacher or teachers this is most unfair to the staff of teachers. You reflect upon all if you are going to discuss a matter of this kind in a public journal you ought to be specific so that the innocent will not suffer, but surely such conduct on the part of a teacher as that to which you refer is not a matter for newspaper discussion, except where the teacher's conduct becomes notorious and objectionable in the extreme, and then only as a last resort. You could not but expect that with eleven hundred pupils upon the rolls, and twenty-seven teachers on the staff, there would be complaints, some of them reasonable and some unreasonable. The Board, his always endeavored to deal fairly with every complaint, and will be glad to give every attention to any person who wishes to be heard, but we object to vague and anonymous fault-finding.

For some time rumors have been rife that Lord Strathcona would retire as Canadian High Commissioner in London. The latest report is that on May 24, announcement will be made that His Majesty has been pleased to confer a dukedom upon the distinguished services to the distinguished services to the Canadian cause, and that Lord Strathcona will shortly afterwards relinquish the High Commissioner of Canada and be succeeded by Sir Frederick Borden. The Dominion Government will, it is understood, increase the allowance of the High Commissioner from \$10,000 to \$25,000 a year.

**THE TOWN PARK**

Some years ago Mr. Richard Sylvester purchased a piece of land on the north side of the park, with a frontage of 70 feet on Peel-st. and a depth of half the block. Mr. Sylvester now offers it to the town for practically what it cost him—\$300, and at that price it would be snapped up by any bidder as a bargain, but as Mr. Sylvester's original intention was to turn it over to the town for park purposes, he still adheres to that purpose.

The filling of the addition to the park is now well under way, and as the Sylvester lot is considerably higher a large amount of soil could be taken from it and applied as top dressing to the rough soil and grasses dumped on the adjoining lot, and the town could in a measure recoup itself in this way for the expenditure necessary to acquire the lot.

We understand the Council intends setting out trees in the annex to the park, and our Alderman will make no mistake in getting the plot in shape as soon as possible, so that it may be seeded down. Every citizen is proud of our present park, which has more than repaid the expenditure and the small additional cost of the proposed extension will undoubtedly be endorsed by the citizens. Mr. Sylvester's generous offer may not be available next year, and should be closed with at once.
