Falls, where five thousand horse power is being developed for transmission to Feterboro. The acquisition of Buckliern Fails has been contemplated for some time by the company. At Buckborn Falis two thousands additional horse power will be developed and transmitted to Peterboro and the surrounding towns, as soon as machinery can be installed. In all the company has 50,000 borse powor available.

The company's head offices are Toronto. The further extension of the enterprise is only a matter of regotiating for further scoplies of power in a district which is rich in water pewer.
