HOWRY, SR., TOOK POISON.

Father of the Messrs. Howry, Form erly Lumbermen at Fenelon Falls. A dispatch from Kansas City, Missour, says: John Howry, once a millionair lumber dealer at East Saginaw, Mich., who had Boston connections, died at a hospital from the effects of a dose of morphine taken with suicidal intent at a lodging house on Monday night last. Howry was 70 years old. He planned his death deliberately and his condition was not discovered by the police uncil Tuesday morning, when he was found unconscious. He had written a note to a local undert ker giving instructions for the care of his body and had prepared a message to his sons, J. H. and K. H. Howry, who were associated with him in the cattle business at Naravista, N. Mexico. His note included the words : "I took morphine. Cause business troubles with my son, J. H. Howry." One of his sons from New Mexiso is expected here to take charge of the remains.


