pay for it out of the general fund next year.  
Ald. Storer said he had instructed Inspector Growden to have the walks plastered. As for the side drains, Ald. O'Reilly was the first to oppose a proposition made by him (Ald. Storer) some time ago to have the drains put in as the work progressed, hence he would disclaim all further responsibility.  
Ald. O'Reilly—"I never heard you make any such motion, and Ald. McCrea and Ald. McWatters say the same thing."  
Ald. Storer—"I didn't make a motion, but a proposition."  
Ald. O'Reilly—"Whatever it was we didn't hear it at any rate."  
Reference was made to the fact that stones were falling and being washed out of the walks in places owing to the walk faces not being plastered, and Ald. Robinson held that it was a great mistake to build walks without a curb. A Toronto contractor had told him that he estimated the life of a walk laid without a curb at only three years.  
Ald. O'Reilly—"Well, Ald. Storer was given authority six weeks ago to have the walks plastered."  
Ald. Storer—"Mr. Growden said last Thursday that he thought he could get a man, and if he hasn't we will have to let Contractor Miller do it—'he said he would.'"  
Ald. Cinnamon—"In any event we can't leave it to Miller—he's a contractor and would want a profit."  
Ald. O'Reilly—"We've got to be careful: the exact cost will have to be charged against each walk. Some of them need a lot of plastering and others none, and it would be unfair to make the latter bear part of the cost of the former."  
Ald. Storer argued that he was too busy with his private affairs to go about hunting for men, and Mayor Sotheran said he would look after the matter. It was suggested that the sidewalk drains be let by tender.  
Market Improvements  
Ald. McWatters, chairman of the Town Property committee, submitted a plan of the proposed improvements to the market hog-pen, and Clerk Knowlton was instructed to call for tenders for the work.  
Council then adjourned.
