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MARIPOSA COUNCIL MATTERS

THE COURT OF REVISION TRANSACTED A LOT OF BUSINESS. Minutes of the Meeting Held on Monday 8th last. The Municipal Council of Mariposa met at Oskwood on Monday, June 8th. The members were all present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. A Batch of Accounts. The Reeve presented an account of \$30 from Mr. J. F. Cummings for stationery supplied at the Division Court for the last six years. The Reeve and Mr. Michael waited on Mr. Cummings and he finally decided to accept \$20 in settlement of the same. Mr. T. G. Irwin, the assessor for the Court of Revision, was present and presented his reports of the equalizing of the union school sections. Mr. Wm. Channon presented his account in detail for grading and crushing stone on lots 22 to 24, com. 9. Somewhere about 125 cords of stone have been collected during the last three years by statute labor, and the total cost of grading and crushing stone this year will amount to \$375. Mr. Finlay Sinclair was present and signified his willingness to lease one quarter of an acre of land for a gravel pit for \$20, and the clerk was instructed to prepare the necessary papers before the next meeting of the Council. Mr. P. S. Mark purchased a gravel pit containing 5-16ths of an acre for \$125 from Mr. Samuel W. ... They Held a Court of Revision. The Council then formed into a Court of Revision for the purpose of considering the assessment rolls, each member taking the oath of office. After carefully considering several appeals, the Court decided to confirm the assessments of the assessor with the exception of a small change in the case of Mr. John McMillan and Mr. Rufus Hall's assessment, a quarter of an acre being added to the latter's assessment. The total assessment for Mariposa for 1903 is \$2,600,000. Mr. Robert Eakins presented an account of \$190.50 for getting stones crushed in his vicinity; these stones were also collected by statute labor. The bonus of 30 cents per cord on wire fences was paid Mr. Parkinson for 123 rods, Mr. W. Broad, for 17 rods, and Mr. Thos. Grimstone, for 109 rods. Mr. W. P. King presented his account for drawing stone, but the crushing not having been completed the account was not given in full. We have learned since that the total account will be about \$570.
