6286 BOXES OFFERED AT LAST WEDNESDAY'S SALE. Proposals to Make Buyers Deposit a Guarantee to Carry out Contracts.

A meeting of the Peterboro Cheese Board, was held Wednesday, June 8th in the Council chamber, with the following buyers present: Messrs. Kerr, Fitzgerald, Cook, Whitton, Noble, Rollins, Wright and Gillespie.

The President read a few rules and regulations of this Cheese Board and much discussion followed on the matter of making buyers give a deposit of \$100 in guarantee that they would carry out their contracts. On motion the matter was left over until next meeting.

In all 43 factories boarded 6286 boxes. The bidding was opened by Mr. Whitton at 7 1-2 cents; Fitzgerald bid 7 3-4; Cook 7 7-8; Whitton 8.

The following refused 8 cents from Mr. Whitton-Ormonde, Keene, Cayaville, Westwood, Lakeland, Fraserville, Fleetwood, Percy, Myrtle, Indian River and the church.
