### THE TRENT VALLEY CANAL.

The Port Hope Canal Association has issued a circular pointing out the advantages of that town as an outlet for the Trent Valley Canal, says the Toronto World. It is pointed out that a ravinc extends all the way from Rice Lake to Port Hepe, making a natural channel. The distance from the Otonabee River to Port Hope is 19 miles, of whichn 13 1-2 miles is caralage, while the distance to Trenton is 58 miles, 19 miles being canalage and 22 miles improved river navigation. These are the figures given in the circular, in which it is also stated that the canal to Port Hope could be easily enlarged, if necessary, to 14 feet, there being little or no rock, while the Trenton route would involve a great deal of rock cutting.
