So let us give each half, the male and the females, each as much thought and consideration as the other.

Looking over the various papers evary month, we find questions somehing like this; 'How many hens can I mate a cockerel to expect good fertile eggs?" In many instances the writer either neglects to mention the breed he has or thinks the editor of that department is a mind reader. Here is a plan that, should you follow it, will be about correct;

Small breedd, such as Leghorns, Hamburgs, Minorcas, Polish, etc., one male to twelve to fifteen females; American or semi-heavy breeds, such as Rocks, Wyandottes, R. I. Reds, C. I. Games, etc., one male to eight or ten females; Asiatic or heavy breeds, such as Brahmas, Cochins, Langshans, etc., one male to from six to use more than the above and get strong, vigorous chicks, I will advise you to use less females, or else a male beyond the ordinary in activ-

Another point to be guarded against in mating your pens is, mating pullets with cockerels and inbreeding too closely. While some of the breeders claim to have success with cockerel pullet matings, it is much safer to mate cockerel-hen or pullett-cock matings, as either side of the yard or yards. Never-unless you thoroughly understand the busmess - mate brother and sister, mo-
