STR. ERIN CUT IN TWO

American Steamer Cowie Run Down in St. Clair River.

2 WOMEN WERE DROWNED

Other Members of the Crew Were Rescued by Fishermen or Drifted Ashore

It is claimed that the Cowie did not stop and render assistance—Erin is owned by Thomas Conlon of Thorold, Ontario.

Detroit, Mich., June 1.—The steamer Erin, up-bound and towing the schooner Danforth, was run into and cut in two by the steamer Cowie in the St. Clair River, just below St. Clair early yesterday, and several members of the Erin's crew were drowned.

The dead are:—

Mrs. Mary Reed, Spanish River, Ont. Watchman, shipped from Detroit; home Amherstburg, Ont.

Woman cook, Mrs. Hubert, Cleveland.

The Erin sank in twenty feet of water. Amos Chester, Fred Chester and Charles McLeod, fishermen on the Canadian side, being close at hand, save six people. Had they not gone to assist, all would have been drowned. The Cowie, it is said, kept right on her course, offering no assistance to the ill-fated craft.

The Erin is owned by Thomas Conlon, of Thorold, Ont., and the Cowie by the United States Transportation Co. of Cleveland. The collision occurred during a fog. The Cowie is a modern freighter, and it is not thought to have been much damaged, while the Erin was a wooden vessel of the old type.

Six members of the Erin crew and the 13-year-old son of Mrs. Reed, who was on the steamer, were saved. Capt. Sullivan and the boy were picked up by the yawl of the Danforth, while fishermen saved Mate George Patterson, of Port Dalhousie, Ont., James Dugden and Grove Shock, of Windsor, Ont., and Thomas Lyon and George Finshaw, of Givernville, N. Y.

The rescued men were taken to the plant of the Great Lakes Engineering Co., at St. Clair.

The Erin was carrying 80 tons of coal from St. Catharines to Algoma Mills. Officers of the schooner Danforth charged that the Cowie did not stop and assist in the rescue of the Erin crew.

Chief Engineer Patrick Quinn, Fort Dalhousie; Fireman "Bang" Hill, St. Catharines, and the first mate, who were reported drowned, but they later came ashore safely at Courthouse, having clung to drifting wreckage.

ROYAL WEDDING, THEN A TRAGEDY

Bomb Thrown At Spain's Young King and Queen.

SAVED BY ELECTRIC WIRING

Personal and Military Attendants of the Royal Pair, to the Number of 16, Torn to Fragments by the Explosion—King and Queen, Composed, Changed Their Carriage and Were Driven to Palace.

Madrid, June 1.—The public rejoices over the marriage of King Alfonso and Princess Victoria had a terribly dramatic sequel at 2.30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, as a bomb thrown from an upper window exploded with deadly effect near the coach occupied by the King and Queen. Providentially, the King's coach appeared to be protected by a great roar, while the multitude wildly waved handkerchiefs, fans and parasols. His Majesty could plainly be seen smiling and bowing to the popular greetings.

Immediately following the royal coach came the bride's party, forming another glittering array of gala coaches.

Wedding Procession.
The wedding cortege started from the Royal Palace at 9.30 a. m. amid the ringing of church bells, the firing of artillery salutes and the clamorous enthusiasm of the crowds massed along the route.

Following the Spanish grandees and princesses were the visiting princes, including the Prince and Princess of Wales, Royal Bride and Bridegroom.

As the King's coach appeared it was greeted by a great roar, while the multitude wildly waved handkerchiefs, fans and parasols. His Majesty could plainly be seen smiling and bowing to the popular greetings.

Immediately following the royal coach came the bride's party, forming another glittering array of gala coaches.

bearing the lords and ladies in waiting and the princess and princesses of the House of Battemberg, and finally came the famed mahogany coach with the radiant bride, Princess Victoria, attended by her mother and Queen Marie Christina.

Flowers showered on the bride.

The appearance of the princess who was about to become their Queen aroused the people to the highest pitch of emotion. Men and women cheered and shouted friendly salutations, while the bride looked most charming and gracefully acknowledged the continued ovations.

Ceremony at the Church.
On reaching the Chamber of Deputies the cortege came in sight of the Church of St. Jeronimo el Real, which was magnificently adorned for the ceremony. Over the entrance was suspended an immense canopy of red and yellow velvet embroidered with Spanish escutcheons and supported on gold-tipped lances. Awaiting the bridal party stood lines of halberdiers and palace guards.

The crucial moment.

As the royal couple entered the assemblage arose and 300 choristers intoned a processional march. The King

MR. SIFTON'S ABLE DEFENCE.
Administration of West in the interests of the People.

Ottawa, June 1.—High-water mark in the debating annals of the present session was reached yesterday when the Government's head policy, Necessity from his long administration of the Interior Department Hon. Clifford Sifton, in his answer to the attack of the Opposition attacks. Yesterday the ex-Minister broke his long silence in a lengthy speech, the excellence of which even drew congratulations from Mr. Foster. Mr. Sifton was thoroughly at home in his subject, and the defence he offered was complete and convincing. As he reviewed the tangled and veiled history of the West in 1896, and then turned to the successful administration since that date, he roused frequent cheers from the Government benches. Both sides of the House listened throughout the long exposition of the Government's position. Mr. Foster followed Mr. Lake also spoke, and Mr. Turritt will continue the debate to-day.

Canada's Customs.
Ottawa, June 1.—Canada's customs collections for the eleven months of the fiscal year terminating yesterday amount to \$42,111,810, an increase of \$4,286,083 as compared with the same period of the year previous. For the month of May they amount to \$4,124,355, a gain of \$508,585.

Medicines Adulterated.
Ottawa, June 1.—Hon. Wm. Templeman presided at the special committee on patent medicines yesterday. Dr. Dube, professor at Laval, was examined. He said that about 75 per cent of standard drugs were adulterated. This was owing to the keen competition in the business. The Government has opposed the sale of patent medicines. He thought the Government should have all patent medicines analyzed so that it would be known what they contained.

Big Bulldog Tears Child.
St. John, N.B., May 31.—With the teeth torn from his face, arms and legs and clothing saturated with blood, little Roy Campbell, aged seven years, was rescued from the clutches of a giant bulldog early last evening. It is feared he will die.

Found Guilty of Murder.
Windsor, N.S., May 31.—George Stanley, whose trial for the murder of Freeman Harvie, near Ellershouse, Hants County, has been going on for the past few days, was found guilty yesterday, and sentenced to be hanged on Aug. 1.

ITS POWER USURPED

DECLARES PEASANT LEADER

Abolition of the Death Penalty and General Amnesty Advocated in Fiery Words, But Constitutional Democrats and Moderates Induce Parliament to Legislate and Accept Compromise Resolution.

St. Petersburg, June 1.—Indignation over the execution of the eight revolutionists at Riga on the heels of the interpellation of the Government on the subject adopted by the Lower House of Parliament created a storm with the opening of the session yesterday.

After the reading of a message of congratulation from the President of the Argentine Parliament, touched by extremely cordial terms, which was received with much applause, the group of Radical Constitutional Democrats, supported by the workman group, urged the necessity of immediately framing a law to abolish the death penalty, in view of the Government's refusal to cease executions.

The majority of the speeches were extremely revolutionary in tone and the moderate Constitutional Democratic leaders had hard work in stemming the tide of radicalism which threatened to carry the House off its feet.

M. Alladin, the peasant leader, urged the necessity for the instant adoption of a law abolishing the death penalty and proclaiming general amnesty, as a supreme act of Parliament without regard to the action of the upper House or the Government, or else parliament is impotent, and its power has been usurped by the "owners of the Cosacos and machine guns."

Father Poyarski, an orthodox priest of Voronezh, was second only to M. Alladin in violence of language. He declared that if the death penalty was not immediately abolished it would be the duty of Parliament to resolve to cease its attempt to legislate, disband and go home.

M. Naboukoff, leader of the Constitutional Democrats, Prof. Kusmin Karaviev, of the Tver delegation and other moderates, pleaded with the House not to take such a defiant step. While warmly insisting on the advisability of passing a law abolishing the death penalty, he urged the wisdom of legislating in a legal fashion, and not forcing a rupture before the authority of Parliament had been established in the country.

In the end a compromise resolution was passed, practically with unanimity, instructing the committee on the violability of any person to present a bill within five days providing for the abolition of the death penalty, the bill to be considered urgent and the president of the House to fix a day for its consideration, not later than June 9.

Toronto, June 1.—Dr. T. S. Sproule, M. P., was re-elected head of the grand lodge of British America, L. O. E., making the fifth time, at the closing session of the annual convention last night. Vancouver will be the next place of meeting.

Washington, June 1.—Gen. Greely reported to the War Department yesterday that the destitute persons in San Francisco number 87,421 in the Oakland district 3,916, and in the Sausalito district 6,000.

Poisoned by Weeds.
Petersburg, June 1.—Hugh Gilbert Collins, 23 years old, who lives in Enslensme Township, near here, is dead, from blood poisoning, having been poisoned by the weeds while ploughing.

Million Dollars Lost.
Portland, Ore., June 1.—A despatch to the Oregonian from Pendleton, Oregon, says that the damage in Umatilla County from the flood of the past two days may reach \$1,000,000.
