Several of those killed were standing on the balcony of the house from which the bomb was thrown. The explosion occurred just as the royal couple were about to enter the palace, shaking the buildings in the vicinity, shaking the buildings in the vicinity, and stumming a sarge member of people, and throwing the cortege into inextricable

King and Queen Safe. The royal coach was brought to sudden stop by the shock, officers and soldiers of the escort falling to the ground about the equerry and horses that had been killed. The screams of the terrified multitude mingled with the groans of the dying.

It was immediately seen that the royal coach was intact, except as it had been damaged by flying splinters. King Alfonso immediately alighted and assisted Queen Victoria out of the carriage. They then entered another coach and were driven swiftly to the palace. In the meantime the scene of the tragody presented a horrible spectacle, with dead men and horses lying about,

literally torn to pieces. Intense excitement prevailed. Miscreant Captured. The place from which the bomb was thrown is a boarding house. The chamber from which the missle was hurled was taken May 22 by a man from Barcelona, giving the name of Manual. When the police surrounded the house the man attempted to fiee but was captured. Another man escaped over

One of the injured proved to be a gon-in-law of Premier Moret's private Concealed in Bouquet.

An official statement says: The bomb which was concealed in a bouquet, was of polished steel half a centimeter thick. It was thrown from a third floor window. The house is opposite the Church of the Sacrament and the captain-general's residence. The royal procession had come to
